**THE BOARD OF HEALTH.**

RESULT OF YESTERDAY'S CONFERENCE WITH PHYSICIANS.

House to House Inspection Throughout the City to be Made—Statement to Consul Mills.

At the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon, the following physicians attended with members: Drs. McGrew, McKibbin, Stangenwald, Herbert, Cooper, Smith, Myers, Surmann, Wayson, Howard and Murray. Ministers King and Hatch, W. T. Monsarrat, V. S., and Senator McCandless were also in attendance.

President W. O. Smith stated that the Board desired the opinion of physicians on the sickness in town, of which two new cases had developed that day.

Dr. Myers reported having visited Iwilei, where the first cases were found, along with C. B. Reynolds, executive officer of the Board. They found the houses clean, and by direction of the doctor all the rubbish about the place was burned.

After an examination of specimens the doctors were asked for their opinions. Drs. McGrew, Surmann, Stangenwald and McKibbin were all against the sickness being cholera. It was agreed, however, that all cases of bowel complaint should be carefully treated.

Nobody not having direct business with the steamer Monowai will be allowed to go on the wharf when she arrives.

Artesian water was to be turned on, and reservoir water shut off, the mains today.

The Board has made the following statement to the United States Consul-General:

HONOLULU, H. I., August 21, 1895.  
Official Statement of the Hawaiian Board of Health to the United States Consul General Ellis Mills:

The steamer Belgic arrived at this port on August 7th, eleven and one-half days from Yokohama, having on board for this port 538 Chinese immigrants. She reported three deaths on the voyage, giving as causes of death, pneumonia in one case and heart disease in two cases.

The Chinese were landed in quarantine, one man being sick with gastro-intestinal disturbance at the time. He died the day after being landed. Two other cases of gastro-intestinal disturbance developed the day the first case died. Of these one recovered, and the other, an old man, died of exhaustion four days later. One young Chinaman became sick the third day after landing and died the following day.

All these cases presented the symptoms of gastro-enteritis, and were considered cholera morbus.

No other suspicious cases have developed since the last case which died August 16th.

Five cases of cholera morbus, with one death, have developed in Iwilei, Honolulu, since Sunday the 18th.

Officers of the Board are making a special inspection of dwelling places, and the public are requested to act as follows:

1. To render all assistance to the agents of the Board.
2. To obey the instructions of the health agents.
3. To put drains, cesspools, privy-vaults and other receptacles of refuse in good sanitary condition.
4. To have all garbage and other decaying refuse promptly removed, and all sources of noxious smell disinfected. Chloride of lime is a cheap as well as good disinfectant. Carbolic acid is also an effective purifier—three table-spoonfuls to a gallon of hot water, well stirred.
