Origin of Coal.

was held that under the code the right to imprison for debt on final process in cases of fraud is sanctioned. The court derives this by implication from a provision of the code, sec. 72 Practice Act, which has reference to arrest on mesne process and not final process.

All that is essential for me to hold in this case is that imprisonment for debt, where a fraud is alleged or shown, and where judgment has been obtained and the defendant is unable to discharge or secure the same, is illegal, and so much of the statute as authorizes such imprisonment is contrary to the Constitution, and I so hold.

Let the petitioner be discharged.

The case against Yamamoto and Morita was then continued till this morning; when it was again postponed until tomorrow to suit the convenience of the attorneys engaged.

Timely Topics When It Comes

The able address by Mrs. Sturtevant-Peet, president of the California Woman's Christian Temperance Union, on the occasion of the annual convention of that body in San Francisco, contained a passage which takes strong ground on the benefits of the bicycle.

"All know the value of a strong unhindered body. For this reason the banishment of the corset and restricting bands is a foregone conclusion. Dress reform has pressed its claims for forty years, with little progress till the bicycle, that graceful, silent steed of motion, dashes through and bursts open the door of prejudice.

It has its virtues as well as its charms. It invites, yea, demands, simplicity in dress. It encourages physical exercise and utterly refuses to carry a drunken rider. Unlike the horse, it balks when touched by the hand of inebriety. It inconveniences and discourages the use of cigars and cigarettes to the number of 65,000,000 a year.

This is a straightforward expression from an able woman who led the California forces of one of the greatest National organizations ever instituted for the uplifting of the race. The dignity and earnestness which characterize her opinion cast into the shades the hallow objections which some physicians have made to the bicycle. Mrs. Peet gives us to understand that in the sole aspect of requiring women to dress sensibly this simple instrument of locomotion has accomplished more at a dash than the preachers on sensible dress for women have been able to bring about in nearly half a century.
