

POLICE COURT NEWS.

Fined Fifty Dollars for Assaulting a Chinese Boy.

There was a long array of defendants in attendance on Judge Perry yesterday, but there was not the same anxiety to get to the front as there was last night at the box office of the circus, and some of them even needed a little coaxing from the clerk and bailiff to approach within firing distance of His Honor.

Namanu was made happy by being the charge of assault and battery against him dismissed, while His Honor promptly confiscated half of the \$6 deposited by Kekekolio as security for his attendance at Court this morning on the charge of being drunk in a public place.

Chong Young, who by way of variety occasionally calls himself Ah Wo, will know better than to offer a policeman \$7 to let him go the next time he is arrested. He ought to know that a Honolulu policeman can't be touched with such an insignificant sum as seven pieces of silver. In consideration of paying a \$50 fine for having opium in his possession the Court let the attempt at bribery go by this time. Mung Wo, a Chinese lady who was hauled in on the same charge, was allowed to depart, as Ah Wo said he was guilty enough for both.

Thirty-two natives of all sizes, shapes and sexes who were arrested by Captain Coose's mounted patrol yesterday for fishing in Nuuanu stream were discharged on promising not to do it again.

Six native boys arrested and brought over from Koolau by order of the Marshal for assaulting an inoffensive Chinese boy on the beach between Kaalaea and Koolau on November 24th were the last to appear for justice. Four of them were noble pros'd and William Hookano and Mailekini placed on trial. Marshal Brown prosecuted and A. G. M. Robertson defended. The Court found Hookano guilty and fined him \$50 and costs. The other was discharged. Notice of appeal from the decision was given.

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
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
