Big Snake Fossil.

The Yokohama Mail prints the following account of an interesting discovery:

Several native papers made a statement on the 18th instant, that the skeleton of a serpent some 170 feet in length had been unearthed at Yamabe-mura, Kadzusa province, in the route of the Bosa railway. Prof. Yokohama Matajiri, Professor of the College of Science, has proceeded to the spot indicated under instruction of the Government, to personally observe the curiosity. His report in regard to this is that the skeleton was found 130 feet above sea level and belongs to a species which had existence several tens of thousand years ago, and impressions from fossilized creatures of the same epoch bear out the statement.

THE JAPANESE THEATER.

Accident to One of the Performers Last Night.

Another large audience assembled at the Japanese acrobatic exhibition last night but the enthusiasm of those present at the marvelous feats performed was dampened by an accident to one of the acrobats named Takizawa Hidikichi, a boy fourteen years of age.

Part of this boy's performance consists of walking across of series of trapezes while hanging by his feet. This had been successfully concluded and the boy had caught the trapeze with both hands to rest himself. While holding on with one hand and wiping off the perspiration with the other, his hand suddenly slipped and he dropped feet first to the stage thirty feet below. He was carried to the dressing room where he was attended by Drs. McKibbin and Wood. It was found that his left thigh was broken and his upper li cut. He was sent to the Queen's Hospital, where he is doing well.

During the rehearsal yesterday Manager Evans had insisted on the use of a net in this part of the performance and had provided one for the purpose, but last night the acrobats refused to perform with it, saying that it was unnecessary and bothersome.

The program has been changed in consequence of the accident, and at the matinee and evening

performances hereafter every precaution will be taken against occurrences of a similar character.
