THEY'RE NOT WELCOME.

There is probably not a baker's dozen of "unreconstructed" royalists in these islands who would give ear for a moment to any adventurers from abroad who came here to create disturbance. Even if there was a ghost of a show for success to any expedition for overturning the now well-established government, there would be but a dismal prospect of popular rights and good government at the hands of buccaneers. If any more advance agents of filibustering schemes come along, they ought hardly to be accorded the dignity of a trial. The best example that could be made of them would be to put them on board the first vessel sailing for the Coast after their capture, and if they have not money of their own to pay their fares make them work their passages before the mast or down in the fire room. That would take all the heroic features out of their occupation and make their examples rather uninviting to be followed by others. It is quite probable that the false stories published on the Coast, and republished here with an air of credence by newspapers that ought to know better, is a cause of the actual appearance on the scene of cranks who think that Hawaii takes easily and kindly to predatory excursions, whose only object is plunder and the power to continue

plundering until the strong hand of some friendly Power intervened. Apart from the strong provisions the Republic has made for its own protection - unnecessarily strong as many think with good reason - there is not the least question that if a piratical expedition descended on these islands, while any national vessel of either the United States, Great Britain, France or even Japan was present, that vessel would be at once available - if called upon - to clean up the whole outfit and perhaps hang the principals to the yard-arm.

OBSERVATIONS.

The customs authorities should be able to appreciate by this time the following lines from Moore: "O, ever thus since childhood's hour I've seen my fondest hopes decay."

The Commercial Journal is giving information about the cultivation of cacao. We lately gave an item of Samoa news, stating that a syndicate was going to plant cacao near Apia. Every new marketable product started here is a benefit to the country.

Among the new industries that have come to the front after years of agitation for something besides sugar to depend upon the cultivation of pineapples is prominent. The BULLETIN has good authority for saying that the success of this industry is now assured, and that the large plantations that have had costly experience in methods are going to pay hereafter.

Organization of those in different callings is coming to be more the rule here than formerly. Within a year there has been formed teachers' associations on different islands and a medical association for the whole group. Now the lawyers propose to form a bar association, and there is no doubt such would be of much benefit to members of the profession.

Good Haul of Dogs.

Ninety dogs are in durance vile at the pound at Iwilei as the result of three mornings' work by the police, but there won't be so many of them tomorrow. All dogs captured without a proper license tag around their necks are taken to the pound and kept two days, during which they may be redeemed upon payment of the license fee, \$1.10, and fifty cents additional for poundmaster's charges. If not redeemed by their owners, the dogs are shot on the third day from their capture, and the first executions of the present raid will take place this afternoon. Twenty two dogs were captured today, and raids will be made every morning until all stray dogs are taken in out of the wet.

St. Andrew's Fair.

The fair and sale of fancy goods of the ladies of St. Andrew's cathedral yesterday afternoon and evening was very successful, about \$180 being realized by the efforts of Mrs. Willis and her associates. A large number of people were present in the evening, and nearly all of the handsomely dressed dolls found a ready sale.
