ABOUT FAKIRS.

It is surprising how low some newspapers will stoop in attempting to vilify people who refuse to do business with them. The Star in Saturday's issue undertakes to call Messrs. Cameron and Wirth "loafers," drunkards and other pet names in a wild endeavor to harm the business relations that Wirth's circus has with the entire community. A member of the Star staff was heard to remark (when asked why he attacked the circus) that it was because they refused to put up, and still another one told Mr. Cameron that as long as they had started to "roast" the circus they would continue especially if the BULLETIN saw fit to champion their cause. TO BE HELD NEXT MAY.

The Regatta of the Hawaiian Rowing Association.

At a meeting of the Hawaiian Rowing Association held last Saturday afternoon, it was finally decided to change the time of the annual regatta from September to May for many reasons, prominent among which was the desire to select a cooler period of the year for the necessary training. The time fixed is the second Saturday in May, which this year falls on the 9th.

There will be no change in the program prepared for last September, and the coming regatta will consist of two four-oared practice shell races for seniors and juniors; one six-oared sliding seat and one six-oared stationary seat barge race and a single sculling match.

The races will take place over the Pearl harbor course and the entry fees and prizes will be the same as announced last September.

The regatta committee consists of Clarence Macfarlane of the Healanis, W. C. Parke of the Myrtles and J. S. Low of the Leilanis.

The Healanis club had two four-oared crews out yesterday, and practice will now commence in earnest with the clubs.

The balloon ascent and parachute leap Saturday was under the direction of that famous balloonist Prof. Price. That the affair was a success was due to his ability in that particular line. His balloon "White Wings" made a beautiful picture and Mr. Burns, who made the ascent, looked like a small-sized mosquito after he got above 4000 feet. 

A tract of land of about 2,500 acres in the simple situate at Kolo and Ololoana 1 in South Kona, Island of Hawaii, about eight miles by a good road from Hookeena, one of the largest villages in Kona. There is an excellent landing on the land itself from where the coffee and other produce could be shipped and a good site for a mill near the landing. Fifty acres of land are in coffee. Roughly estimated there is about seven hundred acres of splendid coffee land lying all on one block on both sides of the Government Road. Eight hundred acres lying above and to the East of the seven hundred acres above mentioned is also excellent land and although at a higher altitude is no doubt also well adapted for coffee culture. The lower land below the coffee belt is suitable for pineapples and sisal.
