THE COELHO CASE.

Judge Wilcox Commits the Defendant for Trial in the Circuit Court.

Judge Wilcox presided at the examination of Wm. J. Coelho this morning on a charge of embezzlement. Chas. Creighton appeared for the defendant, who did not plead.



Judge de la Vergne testified that the defendant was clerk and interpreter of the District Court of which he was the judge, and that as such clerk he had charge of the money paid into court for fines up to February 8 or 9, when in consequence of information received from the deputy marshal he found a shortage of \$140 in the amount turned over by Coelho to him compared with that turned over to Coelho by the deputy marshal's clerk. He called the defendant into his office either on the 8th or 9th and informed him of the discrepancy and asked him if he had been borrowing any money from the government. He said nothing. I then told him I had heard he had borrowed money from the government while he was Marshal's clerk. He then said he had done wrong and would make a full confession of the matter. He said he had taken over \$140 of government money in January. In reply to further questions he acknowledged taking money every month since I had been judge but could not say how much it was in all. I told him his services as clerk were no longer needed. Later in the day he repeated the statements to me in the presence of the Marshal.

Marshal Brown testified to the admissions made by the defendant to Judge de la Vergne in his presence.

For the defense attorney Creighton moved that the defendant be discharged because there is no such office as clerk and interpreter of the District Court, there being no law creating such office or defining its duties. And there is no law by which the defendant could have become entrusted with the control and custody of the money of the Hawaiian government as such clerk. Further there was no evidence that the money was embezzled or that it belonged to the government.

Judge Wilcox overruled the motion and ordered the defendant committed for trial at the next term of the Circuit Court.
