## WATERFRONT ITEMS

### STEAMER MAUNA LOA COMES FROM KONA AND MAUI.

Steamers Kaena and Keauhou With Sugar-Schooner Rob Roy From Hawaii—Other Items.

Light rains are reported in Hakua.

Vessels are getting scarce in the harbor.

The schooner Rob Roy arrived from Hawaii this morning.

The steamer Keauhou with Li hue sugar arrived early this morning.

The bark Palmyra sailed for Port Townsend in ballast this morning.

The steamer Keauhou with 608 bags of Hanamaulu sugar arrived this morning.

The Boston has arrived at Kobe, Japan. The Maine has arrived at Lewes.

The bark Hesper owing to trouble amongst her sailors did not get away for the Sound yesterday.

Tomorrow, high tide large 1:10 p.m.; high tide small 11:10 p.m.; low tide large 4:15 a.m.; low tide small 8:10 p.m.

The bark Colorado cleared for Royal Roads yesterday and expects to leave this evening or early tomorrow thence.

The steamer Kaena arrived in with 550 bags of Waiialua sugar for the bark Irmgard and returned thence this morning.

The steamer Mauna Loa arrived at noon today from Kona. Purser Matthews says there is plenty of rain along the Kona coast but it continues dry in Kau the same as for some months. The volcano of Kilauea is still smoking.

Washington, July 9.—The battle-ship Oregon has sailed from Seattle for Port Angeles for coal. It is stated at the Navy Department that there is not the slightest intention of sending the ship to Hawaii. She is bound for San Francisco and has stayed at Seattle, where she went solely to help out in the Fourth of July celebration, longer than was intended by the Department.

The Hawaiian bark R P Rithet, Thompson master, arrived from San Francisco this morning with a general cargo consigned to Brewer & Co. ### JAPAN UNAPPEARED.

Prospect of a Long and Bitter Diplomatic Wrangle with the United States.

New York, July 9.—The Herald's Washington correspondent says: The Japanese Government, through Minister Hoshi, will make to the State Department tomorrow an undaunted reassertion of its attitude toward the United States in the matter of the annexation of Hawaii. This rejoinder to the reply of Secretary Sherman to the Japanese protest will reiterate with added vigor all the claims and grievances cited in the original protest.

It is not understood that any new grounds for complaint will be adduced, but the indignation of Japan at the lack of consideration with which she feels she has been treated, both before and since the filing of the protest, will be unreservedly expressed. While the officials of the Legation still deny that Japan entertains any desire for the acquisition of Hawaii and renew their protestations that a breach of the friendly relations between Japan and the United States is farthest from her wishes or expectations, it is believed at the State Department that she is not to be placated without a long and bitter diplomatic wrangle.

Japan is very much wrought up over the Hawaiian emigration trouble and the settlement of the indemnity demand, and her insistence that she must have adequate satisfaction for the summary abrogation of her treaty rights by the treaty of annexation, which she will reaffirm in her second protest, are matters which will consume much time and diplomacy to peacefully adjust. The recall of Minister Hoshi is regarded at the State Department as one of the probabilities in the situation.
