ITEMS FROM HARBOR FRONT

Schooner Chas R. Wilson Lumber Laden from Aberdeen.

Commander Hay's Blunder—More Fuss About Passports—Steamer Helene's Pilikia at Paauhau—Some Foreign Items.

Waimea mill has 800 bags of sugar awaiting shipment.

The barkentine S N Castle will not sail until about Sept 29.

Fine weather along windward Kaula coast, no rain and light winds.

The bark S C Allen is receiving the entire cargo of the steamer Mauna Loa.

German ship J C Pfluger from Liverpool is reported overdue, being out now over 150 days.

On account of rough weather the steamer Keahou could not load her Kalihwai freight this trip.

The schooner Chas R Wilson with lumber from Gray's Harbor to the Oahu Lumber & Building Company, will discharge at the railway wharf.

The steamer Helene which arrived in port at an early hour this morning, reports rough weather along the Hamakua coast. A boat was smashed on the rocks containing twenty-five sacks of sugar and was a total loss.

Among the shipments by the last Australia, was one case of Urinary grease. There was considerable discussion among the people who read the manifest at the custom house in San Francisco as to what Urinary grease was, when George H Probasco, M D, the shipper, supplied the information that it is leprosy medicine.

There has been weeping and wailing among the collectors during the past week over some impetuous ones who procured passports at the last minute and left for other pastures. The customs people hope that all this non exeat regno business will be stopped soon, as local creditors seem to think it's the business of the customs bureau to look out for them.

The British steamship Glenloch, the largest vessel that ever entered the Columbia river, arrived at Portland, Or, September 2. She is under charter to the Pacific Export Lumber Company to load ties and lumber for Vladivostok, and will carry the largest cargo of lumber ever put afloat from that river. The vessel made a quick run of 18 days from Kuchinotsu, Japan.

"It was the fault entirely of commander Hay," said harbor master Fuller this morning in referring to the accident to the Warrimoo which caused a delay yesterday afternoon of several hours in that liner's departure for Sydney through getting her propeller caught in the bawser of the bark S. C. Allen. "The officers at the stern of the Warrimoo should have seen that the propeller was clear before starting the engines. Instead of attending to their business and looking carefully over the stern to see that there was no obstruction, they were talking to some passengers. They saw the jib boom of the S. C. Allen within a short distance of the steamer and knew that some line was attached from her to the wharf."

FANATICS USE DYNAMITE.

Whole Companies of Brazilian Troops Wiped Out.

Word has reached Rio de Janeiro to the effect that whole companies of Brazilian troops were destroyed in the last engagement with the fanatics at Canudes. The rebels used dynamite with great effect when the government troops approached to attack, and a great number of soldiers were killed by the explosions.

The fanatics now occupy impregnable positions at Canudes, and the government troops are helpless. General Oscar, who is in command of the troops, will suggest to the Minister of War of Brazil that Canudes be besieged and the fanatics be driven out by hunger. He says it would be foolish to attack them, as they have placed scores of dynamite bombs in the ground around their positions, which will be exploded in the event of a charge, resulting in great loss to his army.
