Liner Moana and Barkentine Wilder With Coast Freight.

Our Hawaiian Steamer China Smashes a Schooner—The Tramp Braemar Not Coming—Another Batch of Japanese.

Sydney, Oct 9. Arrived, S S Warrimoo from Honolulu.

Eureka, Oct 13. Arrived schooner Bertie Minor from Kailua.

The arrival of the Northern Pacific's S S Braemar is indefinitely postponed.

Tatoosh, Oct 10. Passed, schooner Robert Lewers from Honolulu for Puget Sound.

Melbourne, Aug 24—Sailed, Norwegian ship Drammen for Honolulu via Newcastle.

The French cruiser Duguay Trouin hence reached San Francisco on the 12th in ten days.

The barkentine S G Wilder brought a big lot of freight to Irmgard wharf from San Francisco this afternoon.

Nippon Yusen Kaisha's steamship Ryojun Maru, with several hundred Japanese laborers, is due at this port October 30 from Kobe.

Philadelphia, October 12.—The twin clipper ships Tacoma, Captain Gaffrey, and Indiana, Captain Colley, sailed out of the Delaware breakwater this afternoon on a 10,000-mile race. Both are from Philadelphia, the former bound for Tacoma and Seattle and the latter for San Francisco.

The following vessels are chartered for the islands; barkentine Klitkat and schooner Robert Lewers with lumber from Port Gamble to Honolulu, bark Roderick Dhu merchandise from San Francisco to Hilo, barks Andrew Welch, Archer and Mohican with merchandise from San Francisco to Honolulu.

The steamship China arrived in San Francisco October 8 flying the Hawaiian flag, and the first thing she did was to smash into the schooner Five Brothers, causing a loss to the schooner of her jibboom and forward rigging. The China was uninjured. Wanted to show what a good fighting ship for Uncle Sam she will make when annexed.
