ALVAREZ REACHES HOME.

Hawaiian Leprologist and His Work Before the Berlin Congress.

Dr. L. F. Alvarez returned this morning from the leprosy congress which was held in Berlin from the 6th to the 15th of October.

The congress at Berlin was one of the most important from all parts of the world. Dr. Ashmead of New York was not there on account of some dissatisfaction on his part as to the meeting place.

From Berlin Dr. Alvarez went to Paris and visited the Pasteur Institute. He was accompanied by Dr. Cascarquilla, the noted leprologist of Bogota.

A gentleman from Newport, Kentucky, whose name is withheld for the present, arrived by the Australia this morning. Newport is the home town of Albert S. Berry, the Kentucky Congressman who was in Hawaii two months ago, and the statesman induced today's visitor to come to Hawaii.

In an interview the gentleman stated that Mr. Berry is a most enthusiastic friend of annexation and the Islands. On the street corners of his home town and in the hotels crowds gathered around to hear him tell of the beauties of Hawaii, the opportunities for investment and the wisdom of an annexation.
