HAWAII AS AN OUTPOST

Something About President Lincoln's Hawaiian Policy.

Future of the Islands of Peculiar Interest to the People of the United States.

In the stress of the civil war both Great Britain and France persistently sought a pretext for seizing Hawaii while our cruises were pursuing Anglo-Confederate pirates in distant seas or were forming part of the cordon of iron and flame which the Federal Government held about the Southern seaboard. Every diplomatic feint, every naval menace of these hostile powers, jealous of our control of the "key of the Pacific," was thwarted by President Lincoln's vigilance.

The Lincoln policy toward Hawaii was adhered to by the State Department after the great leader's death.

Hamilton Fish, another American Secretary, who succeeded Seward, held to his and to Lincoln's opinion. "The position of the Sandwich Islands as an outpost, fronting and commanding the whole of our possessions on the Pacific ocean," he said in a dispatch to the American Minister in Hawaii in 1873, "gives to the future of these islands a peculiar interest to the Government and people of the United States." These islands, in the hands of "a maritime power, would threaten a military surveillance in the Pacific similar to that which Bermuda has afforded in the Atlantic. We desire no additional similar outposts in the hands of those who may at some future time use them to our disadvantage."

The proposal for annexation, already ratified by the unanimous vote of the Hawaiian Senate, which now awaits action by the American Congress, embodies the logical culmination of a policy which has met the sanction of Lincoln and Grant and their advisers, as it had met the sanction of American Presidents and Ministers before them.—Boston Journal.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS BY AUTHORITY.

Argument in the Rooke Cases Over and Demurrers Submitted.

Judge Wilcox Will Soon Know What to Do About Certain Suits Brought in His Court.

In the Supreme Court A. S. Humphreys, counsel for defendants in the suit of Oahu Lumber and Building Company vs Hee Kin and Hoy Ving, has filed a motion for leave to file the surrender of a lease, and an agreement in relation thereto, the existence of which plaintiff alleges to be its ground for damages. Said defendants also further move the Court to affirm the decision and judgment of the Circuit Court, error, if any there be in said ruling and judgment, having been cured by said surrender and agreement. In the case of John Kalaokoa vs. Wm Henry, plaintiff has filed his bill of costs amounting to \$55.50.

Justice Whiting is the author of a unanimous decision of the Supreme Court in the case of J. M. Vivas vs. Aswan, on appeal from the District Court of Honolulu. The rule is laid down that a judgment of non-suit is no bar to another action for the same cause. The appeal is sustained and the judgment of the lower court vacated and the case is remanded to the District Magistrate who is directed to overrule the plea in bar. A. G. Correa and A. S. Humphreys for plaintiff; J. A. Magoon for defendant.

In the assumpsit case of M. G. Silva vs. M. J. Cabral, on appeal to the Circuit Court from the District Court of Honolulu, where judgment was rendered for defendant, Judge Stanley has filed a decision giving judgment to the plaintiff for the amount claimed. The plaintiff sold certain goods to one William Fernandes on the assurance by the defendant that if Fernandes failed or refused to pay for the same the defendant would be responsible. The defendant admits the promise and that Fernandes has failed to pay but claims that he has not refused to do so. The Court rules that the defendant did so refuse both orally and in writing and that the statute of frauds does not apply. J. Q. Wood for plaintiff; defendant in person.

In the separation suit of Barbara Wolter vs. E. H. F. Wolter, a motion has been filed on behalf of plaintiff for temporary alimony at \$25 per week and \$200 counsel fees. J. A. Magoon and Charles Creighton for plaintiff.

In the matter of the application of Ahn by L. A. Dickey, his next friend, for a writ of mandamus requiring the District Magistrate to entertain a certain suit, the Supreme Court in a unanimous opinion written by Justice Frear decides that a District Magistrate may permit a next friend to bring an action for an infant in his Court, and orders that a peremptory writ may issue as prayed for. No costs to be taxed to either party. L. A. Dickey for the applicant; Attorney-General W. O. Smith, contra. This suit was an amicable one, brought for the purpose of securing a ruling from the Supreme Court on a matter long in dispute.

Argument in the Rooke cases lasted nearly all day yesterday. Mr. Magoon finished at noon. After recess Mr. Ballou followed on behalf of the Bishop Estate and A. G. M. Robertson and P. L. Weaver for the Queen's hospital. Mr. Magoon then made the closing argument and the cause was submitted. Briefs to be filed within twenty days.
