### How to Pack Butter.

Get the butter in good condition as soon as possible after churning and pack it firmly in gallon or half gallon jars. Those containing 5 or 6 pounds are preferable. When the jars are bought, ask the seller as he marks the weight of each to number them, so that a record of the amount of butter in each jar can readily be kept. Pack the jars level full, tie a round piece of strong, thick cloth over the top and place it bottom side up in a new, large crock. Do not pack butters made at different times in the same jar, but store only those jars that can be filled at one churning.

Make strong brine, using all the salt the water will absorb, adding to each gallon a teaspoonful of saltpetre and a teaspoonful of granulated sugar. Soak the brine and skim it thoroughly. When sold, strain through a wet, thick cloth into the crock. Add more brine from time to time to keep the jars covered 4 inches in depth. Tie a thick cloth over the crock to protect from dust and cover this a piece of woolen cover to exclude the light.

Do not keep the crock on the cellar floor, even if it is a cement one, but on a platform, if possible, with slate underneath the crock to insure free circulation of air. This will prevent mould forming on the bottom of the crock.

Several smaller crocks may be used in which to store the jars rather than the large crock. To clean jars and crocks, use a bath of hot lime water or strong hot soda water.

## ITEMS FROM HARBOR FRONT

Bark C. D. Bryant Sails With Sugar for San Francisco Refinery.

W. G. Irwin Overdue—Laborers Off the Gaelic—The Fine Schooner Inca—Liner Aorangi Coming.

Liner Aorangi from Sydney will dock at Oceanic wharf.

The City of Peking sailed at 7:30 o'clock last night for San Francisco.

All the steerage passengers that arrived from Yokohama were released this morning from quarantine.

The tug Elen went on the marine railway for an overhauling today. The Kaena's repairs will be completed tomorrow.

The steamer Waialeale is expected from Kahuku tomorrow and Captain Parker will tell us all about the Arago's blue lights.

The full wing disposition was made of the laborers that arrived on the Gaelic: Kakaiaua plantation 25, H P Fay & Co 39, Lihue plantation 32 and Kekaha plantation 14.

The schooner Inca, now discharging coal at new Fort street wharf, is a fine specimen of marine architecture. She was built by Hall Brothers at Port Bkeley some two years ago. The Inca is partly owned by Honolulu people.

The cargo of the bark Martha Davis for San Francisco yesterday consisted of 22,659 bags of sugar, 2,687,455 pounds, valued at \$89,483, consigned by C Brewer & Co, Castle & Cooke, H Waterhouse & Co and F A Schaefer & Co to Welch & Co and Williams, Dimond & Co.

### Brigantine W. G. Irwin Overdue.

The brigantine W G Irwin is now out over twenty days and although no fears are yet entertained for her safe arrival there are many anxious merchants with goods on board who want them badly. Arriving at the same time in San Francisco and sailing only a few days before the W G Irwin, the brigantine Lurline has returned to Kahului, loaded, and is now on her way back to San Francisco.

### Bark C. D. Bryant's Cargo.

The bark C D Bryant sailed for San Francisco this afternoon with 26,530 bags of sugar, 3,210,151 pounds, valued at \$120,352 and shipped by H Hackfeld & Co and M S Grinbaum & Co for account of Lihue, Haamaulu, Kekaha, Lahaina, Kahuku and Heeia plantations to Williams, Dimond & Co and M S Grinbaum & Co. Captain Colly's illness yesterday caused a delay in the C D Bryant's departure. He ordered his cook to prepare him a dose of Rochelle salts, instead of which, by mistake, the cook gave him saltpetre.
