CLAIMS AND SMALL DEBTS

Bill to Pay Eighty-four Thousand Dollars Passes Senate.

Judiciary Committee Reports Against Action by a Single Branch—Sympathy Given Senator Schmidt.

In the Senate this morning after the usual preliminaries Senator Holstein introduced a petition from residents of North Kohala asking that \$3000 be appropriated to construct a wagon road from Honokaa-iki landing to the government homestead lands at Awini.

Senator Rice from the Printing Committee reported Senate Bill No. 3 as revised and Senate Bills No. 10 and 15 printed and ready for distribution.

Four reports were received from the Judiciary Committee on House Bills. Senator Brown from the Judiciary Committee presented the following report on the President's message relating to House Resolutions:

The Judiciary Committee to whom was referred the message of the President relative to resolutions passed by only one branch of the Legislature, upon the action course to be taken by the Executive branch of the Government, say, that in their opinion such a resolution should be joint, and as such an expression by the Legislature and not of a branch or part thereof. The Legislature acts as an entirety, and in our opinion neither the Senate as such, nor the House of Representatives as such and each independently of the other, has or should have the right to direct or control the action or course to be taken by the Executive branch of the Government.

On motion of Senate McCandless the report was referred to the Joint Rules Committee. Senator McCandless gave notice of his intention to introduce a bill to convert land at Aala into a public park. Senate Bill No. 3 was taken up as revised and passed the second reading as a whole. The bill appropriates \$84,215.17 for the payment of claims, unpaid bills and salaries due prior to December 31, 1897, of which the following is a recapitulation:

The third reading of the bill was set for Tuesday next. Senate Bill No. 10, the opium bill, was read by title and on motion of Senator Brown was referred to a special committee of five, to be announced later by President Wilder.

Senate Bill No. 15, to provide land for wharves for the Oahu Railway Company, was read by title on second reading and referred to a special committee of three, to be announced later.

House Bill No. 13, coroners' inquests; House Bill No. 7, authorizing convictions of accused in certain cases; substitute to House Bill No. 4, service of summons, and House Bill No. 1, relating to suspension of sentence, all passed second reading.

A motion to take up Senate Bill No. 4, current account, which had previously been laid on the table to await the introduction of the Loan Act, brought on a discussion which lasted until noon, some of the members being in favor of working on the bill while others wanted to await the coming of the Loan Act.

At noon Senator Brown moved that the Senate do adjourn until 10 o'clock tomorrow out of respect and sympathy to Senator Schmidt in his bereavement. Carried.

The Rainfall.

An erroneous statement was made in this morning's paper concerning the rainfall thus far this year. The rainfall for last year as measured by W. W. Hall at his Nuuanu Valley home was 26.53 inches. This year the fall has been Jan., 5.95 inches; Feb., 9.04 inches and to date this month 2.40 inches, making a total for the two months and a half of 17.39 inches or more than half of what fell last year.
