AFTERNOON HOUSE SESSION.

Duty on Japanese Sake Reduced from \$1 to 50 Cents a Gallon.

Minister Cooper replied as follows to Mr. Atkinson:

"I know of no school or educational establishment of a sectarian character that is being supported by the Government."

Mr. Atkinson stated that Labaiulana school on Maui was, he had understood, to all intents, a sectarian school. Profession of Christianity was required of pupils there. The school was directly under the support of the Government. Question and answer referred to the Committee on Education.

Mr. Robertson presented a petition signed by 500 residents of Honolulu praying for the passage of the bill granting a franchise to the Honolulu Rapid Transit Company. Referred to Electric Committee.

The light wines bill was again taken up. Mr. Robertson's motion to reduce the duty on sake from \$1 to 50 cents a gallon resulted in a vote of 6 to 6. The Speaker voted in favor of the motion, carrying it. Vote on the bill, second reading, resulted also in a tie. The Speaker carried it.

House bill 45, actions against the estates of deceased persons, passed second reading.

House bill 62, an act to prohibit a child under 15 years of age from smoking tobacco, came up on second reading.

After considerable discussion from every side of the house, consideration was postponed till today.

At 3:15 the House adjourned.

Lydiek Will Recover.

Frank Lydiek, the man run over by a hand car on the railroad Wednesday afternoon, is on a high road to recovery. His internal injuries were not so serious as was at first supposed. Lydiek will be out again by Monday.
