## SUSPICIOUS OF GERMANY

### British Distrust of the Kaiser's Plans in the Philippines.

Alleged to Be Seeking Russia's Favor—Scheming to Secure One of the Islands for a Naval Station.

New York, July 16.—A cable to the Sun from London says: Now that Santiago has finally surrendered, European attention is centered chiefly on Germany's attitude in the Philippines. It is not unnatural that English suspicion of German designs is quite as strong as American distrust. It is general belief here that in the absence of any German disavowal, after Dewey's official report on the Irene incident, the designs of the Berlin Government are not disinterested, and almost certainly are in the direction of aggrandizement. Certain diplomats even assert that they have positive knowledge of Germany's determination to obtain one island in the Philippine group. Others affirm that Germany's policy is designed to secure the good will of the Czar, with the understanding that Russia will consent to certain compensation elsewhere if Emperor William succeeds in maintaining a foothold in the Philippines.

Meantime, as far as the official relations go, there is no doubt that Germany is endeavoring to maintain an attitude of technical correctness. Ambassador White apparently retains belief in German good faith. The Berlin correspondent of the Sun telegraphs this afternoon that White today authorized him to quote him as follows: "There is no real cause for disquietude over Germany's attitude. Throughout the war the German Government has been as friendly as is consistent with neutrality toward both belligerents. The Irene story, so far as known here, is an invention or grossly exaggerated. The presence of German vessels at Manila need not have created bad feeling, in view of the uncertainty as to what turn the insurrection might take. "There is nothing unfriendly in ordering ships to stop at Manila on the way home. Now that matters are assuming an aspect which relieves Germany of the fear that her people will be endangered, her vessels have been ordered away. I am convinced that their presence never meant designs unfriendly to America, or anything beyond protecting ordinary German interests from the insurgents. I am further convinced that as the character of the war is being better understood, German feeling is growing more friendly daily."

What ever may be said of the German attitude toward the United States politically, there are ample indications of a rapid development of German commercial rivalry into a condition which threatens speedy culmination in a tariff war.

Berlin, July 18.—The recent speech of United States Ambassador White is gradually having a good effect. The tone of the German press, with the exception of the rabid anti-Americans, has distinctly changed. Many of the newspapers which have hitherto been unfriendly are now just the opposite.

Mr. White's Fourth of July oration has also strengthened his position here. It is understood that the withdrawal of some of the German war ships from Manila was due to his pointing out that the feeling of the Americans at such a formidable array of German ships in the harbor was one of suspicion as to the intention of Germany.

An official of the Foreign Office, explaining the attitude of the German Government, said: "The presence there of our war ships was solely due to our desire to protect German interests in the Philippine islands, which are too large for one or two ships to protect in the event of things going wrong, as the presence of the ships at various points at the same time might be necessary."

"When they first appeared Admiral Dewey was unable to land a force sufficiently strong to protect the foreigners from the semi-savage hordes of insurgents, who were also a source of danger to the Germans. In view of the repeated assurance of neutrality on the part of Germany and the friendly

sentiments existing between the two countries, the American suspicions are unfounded."

The newspapers are discussing the question of the future of Samoa and the Caroline islands. The Schlesische Zeitung recalls President McKinley's announcement that the United States is not willing to give up its rights in Samoa.
