HAWAIIAN NATIONAL LEAGUE.

Business Transacted at a Meeting Held Yesterday.

At a meeting of the Hawaiian National League held yesterday afternoon, the following business was transacted:

Memorial to Commission as drawn up by the committee, read and laid on the table subject to future action.

Clerk instructed to reply to the Waianae natives granting their request that they be allowed to send delegates to Honolulu to examine the memorial.

Clerk instructed to reply to the Hui Aloha Aina telling them of the acceptance of their request to join with the Hawaiian National League under the following conditions:

1. That the Hui Aloha Aina change its preset platform which is against annexation.
2. That the Hui Aloha Aina delegates meet with them for the special purpose of considering the memorial to be presented to the Commission and for none other.

Tomorrow's Race Events.

The Championship races set for tomorrow afternoon promise to be of the most exciting nature. Those who have watched the practise of the crews on the Pearl harbor course give it as their opinion that the Healanis will come out winner in the Senior event.

As to the Junior event, it is agreed that the struggle will be an even one between the crews.

ign jury. He was also exact and methodical in preparing his cases. Privately Mr. Rosa always evinced a light and gay disposition. He was very companionable. At the same time he felt deeply on public matters, being always ready to discuss them with intelligence and force. He was a member of the Legislature of 1890 and one of its most powerful debaters. His politics was always Nationalist.

The funeral will take place from the Catholic cathedral to the Catholic cemetery at 4 o'clock this afternoon. These will be the pall bearers: S. C. Dwight, C. B. Wilson, Carl Mett, Henry Smith, J. K. Kahookano, J. K. Kaulia, Attorney-General W. O. Smith and Justice W. A. Whiting.

A platoon of police under Lieut. Warren will escort the procession, which will be led by the Hawaiian band.

At the adjourned meeting of the Bar tomorrow morning a committee will be appointed to draft suitable resolutions touching the memory of Mr. Rosa.

NO RIFLE MATCH.

The Sharpshooters Not in Position to Challenge the New Yorkers.

There is no prospect of a match, for a good while at least, between Honolulu marksmen and the crack shots of the New York Regiment. Captain F. S. Dodge was asked about it this morning. 
Red Cross Society Ball.
