Another Memorial Framed.

would otherwise, if properly taxed, compel them to divide and sell and thereby increase, not only our population of independent citizens, but also of the Anglo-Saxon race as well, as the wealth of the country; and

Whereas, the younger generation of Portuguese of both sexes raised and born in these Islands are practically Americans, not only in sentiment, but in the command of the language and ways, although the facilities of free education are so limited, notwithstanding our almost perfect school system, and consider these Islands their permanent home, more so now that they are a part of the Great Republic of the United States of America; and

Whereas, the colony's great hope was to see Hawaii annexed as a State of the Union as was expressed to the nation through the Honorable John T. Morgan; and

Whereas, it is still its desire, but in default of it, its asks that Hawaii be made at least a Territory under similar conditions of other Territories of the United States of America, with a franchise similar to the one enjoyed by a large number of people of Hawaii under the Constitution of 1887, considering itself entitled to the same privilege as other Portuguese citizens are entitled to in the United States of America, and the citizens of that great country in Portugal;

Therefore, be it resolved: by the Portuguese citizen of Honolulu, in mass meeting assembled, at Honolulu, representing the Portuguese colony in the Hawaiian Islands in its entirety:

That it is the colony's earnest and sincere desire that Hawaii be as a State of the Union, and if that be impracticable then at least as a Territory.

That the Honorable Commission appointed under the Newlands Resolution do recommend such a step, taking into consideration the importance of the Islands to the United States:

That the franchise enjoyed by the people of Hawaii under the Constitution of 1887 be granted to the people now residing here or who may come hereafter under similar conditions and with identical qualifications.

That contract labor be entirely abolished, as it is a system not only repugnant to free institutions, but as a well known fact is clearly in contradiction to the principles of the American Constitution as it stands today.

That in case of the annexation

of Hawaii as a Territory, that the Congress of the United States protect the rights and privileges of all the citizens of the civilized races now residing in the Hawaiian Islands or that may hereafter become such residents, by adopting such laws as will: a. Establish an equal taxation so as to enable the people of small means to obtain farms according to their desire; b. Establish free schools so as to enable the middle and poorer classes to give their children a higher education than they are able to do at present; c. That all laws and regulations that may from time to time be adopted by the United States in regard to Asiatics be carried into effect also in the Territory of Hawaii; d. That the present Judiciary System of the Hawaiian Island be continued as far as practicable, so as to enable the poorer classes to have their litigation settled by the Local Courts of Justice without the necessity of appeal to any Court outside of the Territory; e. That the Asiatics residing in the country at the date of the transfer of the Hawaiian sovereignty to the United States be not disturbed; but be allowed to hold the same privileges as any other Asiatic residents of the United States; f. That the present Hospital Tax be either abolished or dedicated to the use of hospitals only in which free medical treatment and maintenance is provided for the sick poor of all residents irrespective of nationality or creed.

That a copy of these Resolutions be presented to the Honorable Commission appointed by the President of the United States under the Newlands Resolution and now in session at Honolulu.

I do hereby certify that the above is a true and correct copy of the Resolutions unanimously adopted at a Mass Meeting of the Portuguese Colony held at Honolulu, on the 12th day of September, A. D. 1898.
