

ON CAMPAIGN ISSUES

Tendency of Parties in Coming Congressional Elections.

Democrats Make a Feature of Shipping—Republicans on Hawaii—War and War Bonds.

Washington, D. C., August 31.—Now that hostilities with Spain have ended, interest in the approaching Congressional elections will increase. The effect is noticed already in the increased number of letters asking for campaign literature being received at the Republican and Democratic headquarters in Washington.

Both parties are later than usual in lining up on the issues of the campaign, and the indications point to a short and sharp fight in most of the districts of the country. Issues growing out of the war will figure largely in the campaign, and the silver and tariff questions will be thrown more or less into the background, though the democrats will build one of their principal issues—that of the financial management of the war—on their ideas of free silver and greenbacks, as brought out in the Chicago platform and in the debate on the war revenue bill in Congress. They will criticize the republicans for the bond issue and for the war revenue law, which they claim weighs more heavily on the poor than on the rich. A vigorous attack will be made on the republican policy in dealing with the merchant marine, which, it will be declared, has fallen away to such an extent under the restrictive policy of the republicans that now when new and undreamed of opportunities for commercial expansion are opening up before the American merchants and manufacturers the country has not sufficient mercantile shipping to enable it to avail itself of the opportunities.

SILVER PUSHED ASIDE.
At the Republican Congressional headquarters the indications at present are that there will be little discussion of the silver question unless the democrats force it to the front. Few demands are being received for financial or tariff literature, and most of the applications are for documents relating to the war and to Hawaii. The republicans are managing the literary part of their campaign with considerable shrewdness, and most of the literature that they are sending out to attack the democrats is made up of quotations from democratic speakers in Congress.

Thus, on the subject of Hawaiian annexation, their strongest card is Senator Morgan's scathing arraignment of the obstructionists in the Senate, chiefly on his own side of the chamber, who so long delayed a vote on the annexation resolution. On the question of bonds or greenbacks for carrying on the war, the only literature that has been printed consists the arguments of Senators Gorman, of Maryland, and Lindsay, of Kentucky, and Representative Cummings, of New York, against the position assumed by the majority of their party in both houses in favor of greenbacks rather than bonds. A document has also been compiled bringing together all the instances of democratic opposition to measures necessary to the successful prosecution of the war.

REPUBLICANS UNDECIDED.
The issue of territorial expansion will not figure as prominently in the campaign as might be expected—for two reasons. The first of these is that the republican administration has not yet clearly defined its policy any further than as to the retention of Porto Rico, and has not, therefore, given the democrats an opportunity to take issue with them. The second reason is that, while the republicans are tending toward a policy of expansion and the retention of all the territory taken from Spain, the democrats hesitate to take the opposite course. The indications are unmistakable that too many of the rank and file of the democratic party are in favor of expansion for it to be safe for them to oppose the policy, and they are even now trying to explain away the position assumed by some of their leaders, like Bryan, Bailey and Bland; and to explain that what these men have said has been misinterpreted and

does not really mean what it seems to, but that they are in favor of a proper and reasonable expansion of territory of the United States.
