CATHOLIC BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

A Summary of the Work of Last Year.

At a meeting of the Catholic Benevolent Society held last week, Emma Lucas, the treasurer, presented the following report for the year ending December 31, 1898:

RECEIPTS. Cash on hand, Jan. 7, 1898, \$812 93. Dues, 132 25. Donations, 576 57. Total, \$1521 75

DISBURSEMENTS. Hospital, \$218 75. Assistant to families, rent, etc., 319 90. Educational purposes, 100 00. Burials, 10 50. Total, \$649 15

Balance on hand, Jan., 1899, \$872 60

Although not much is heard of the Catholic Benevolent Society, the ladies are always active in the good work which it is their purpose to carry on and, although the money they usually have on hand is not as large as it might be, still a great deal is done. Families, irrespective of creed or nationality are helped when in trouble, children are educated and, in extreme cases, the dead buried.

From year to year the ladies go about their work of charity in as quiet a manner as possible, finding their reward in the grateful benedictions that come from the poor and needy they assist.

Burke's Money. Consul General Hayward took the money bag of Burke, the stranger who drowned himself off the Claudine, to Bishop's bank for a test of its capacity. Each pocket was made to hold a \$20 gold piece, and, by the criterion thus afforded, Mr. Hayward concludes that all the money Burke should have had, according to his own ante-mortem statements, is satisfactorily accounted for. From the steroom mate of Burke, who gives a very lucid account of the unfortunate man's actions and words, it is learned that the \$50.00 was given to one McDonald in San Francisco, as representing the paving company that employed Burke, and the balance of \$2000 was taken by Burke as his own legitimate earnings.

E. M. Farrington, a soldier who died at Buena Vista hospital, was buried from the Catholic cathedral this forenoon with military honors. He was 28 years of age, and belonged to Co. L, 2nd Engineers, U. S. V. His death was caused by peritonitis.

The whole fire department was called out shortly after noon today to witness the smoke coming from burned meat in a pot on a gasoline stove in Jim Nott's place near the corner of Punchbowl and Beretania streets. Some Portuguese women saw the smoke and becoming hysterical, turned in the alarm without investigating.
