**CHAMBERLAIN'S OPEN DOOR.**

London, January 18.—Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, speaking tonight at the banquet of the Wolvenhampton Chamber of Commerce, reviewed a great length the various threatening foreign questions confronting the Government.

In connection with the withdrawal of the French demand for an extension of the settlement at Shanghai, Mr. Chamberlain congratulated his hearers that Great Britain's opposition to the proposal had been supported by the representatives of the United States.

"That, I think," he said, "a significant and noteworthy fact. Nay, I think and hope it will become history. It shows that circumstances are bringing about the community of interests between Anglo Saxons, which in the future may have far-reaching and beneficial results."

In concluding Mr. Chamberlain paid a high tribute to the success of Lord Salisbury's foreign policy, remarking: "It is cause for satisfaction that two great nations, Germany and the United States, both protectionists at home, have proclaimed their intention to adhere to the principle of the 'open door' in their foreign possessions. We shall regard their expansion without jealousy and shall welcome their co-operation; and I think, without being too sanguine, we may rely upon their sympathy and assistance in securing the general adoption of a principle to which we attach so much importance."

**The Nurses Paid.**

Yesterday the nurses attached to the U. S. hospital service in Honolulu were made happy by the receipt of their pay for several months past. As was reported exclusively in the BULLETIN, upon the departure of the Australia, the nurses had ground for becoming impatient over a long delay in paying their wages. Major Wood gave a satisfactory explanation of the matter, saying at the same time the difficulty was likely soon to be remedied. This promise has happily been realized, not only pleasing the nurses but a number of business people who had given them credits.

**Rev. Garvin Departs.**

Rev. and Mrs. T. D. Garvin leave for the States on the America-Marú tomorrow. Mr. Garvin has accepted a call from the Christian church of Clarksville, Tenn., and will go immediately to his new field. Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Garvin in Honolulu are legion; and good wishes for health and prosperity will follow them in their departure.

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
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
