When the Nippon Maru sailed from San Francisco it was about decided that the Arizona and Scandia would get away for Manila on April 17.

The Kinau was delayed until two o'clock this afternoon in order to be able to take the foreign mail for Hilo and other ports along the route.

The Nippon Maru brought back with her five Japanese stowaways taken to San Francisco on the last trip from the Orient. They were not allowed to land in San Francisco.

The Nippon Maru arrived in port from San Francisco this forenoon after a fine run of 5 days 21 hours and 10 minutes. The Nippon brought 67 passengers for this port and 20 through.

The transport Morgan City arrived in San Francisco April 11. Before leaving Manila there was trouble between the Chief Engineer and Green. The latter was ordered to his room. Then the firemen got into trouble, and, siding with Green, refused to work. These men took the advice of Captain Dillon and went back to work.

Later on, Gus M Moore, one of the firemen, attacked the captain and fell-d him to the deck. Captain Dillon was not down long. As soon as he got on his feet again he took a Mauser rifle and clubbed Moore so that he too fell to the deck. There was to have been a big investigation.

Nabiku Road Contract.  
Judge W. A. McKay of Wailuku has received the contract for building the Nabiku road as far as the appropriation goes, the remainder to await developments. It will take \$30, 00 more than the money appropriated to complete the system planned.

### Change of Captains.
