Y. M. C. A. ANNIVERSARY.

died. The effect of belonging to the body seemed to be to keep men young. However, at a meeting a few years ago, noticing that the workers in office were no longer young, he had demanded that the young membership assume the burden of carrying on the Association. This was done and with gratifying results. When the Association started, there were no street lights, no horse cars, no hacks and very few buggies. More than once, when attending meetings at the old gymnasium, he had lost a saddle. Saddles were highly valued in those days. Mr. Judd's reminiscences were entertaining.

J. B. Atherton, when the Kamehameha singers had given another song, spoke of the different homes of the Association, including, besides, the gymnasium and Fort street church vestry already mentioned, Bethel church, burned down in the great fire of 1886, and the old Sailor's Home, pulled down just after that event as being a menace. The first meeting in the present house was a special one early in 1883, followed by the first regular meeting in May of that year. The gymnasium annex was opened in 1895. It might be that the Association would have to expand its bounds, and, if adjacent property was too high for that purpose, have to go elsewhere for a new site as associations in other cities had to do sometimes. Or it might be found advisable to go farther heavenward for additional room. Mr. Atherton told of the liberality with which members had always responded to appeals for the building fund.

The Association Mandolin Club entranced the ears of the assembly with its sweet melodies, after which Mr. Coleman concluded the literary exercises with a report of the work. He avoided details that had already appeared in the Review, and concentrated his remarks on the desirability of in-

stituting a Social Hall. The fullest work of the Association, he also said, could only be accomplished when the members in general did their part as well as the salaried officers. Bible study he held to be the supreme touchstone of a Y. M. C. A.'s success.

"Blest be the tie that binds," was sung by the assembly, and then followed the finest of tea cream and cake in supply inexhaustible, which was enjoyed amidst a free and easy sociable time.
