"However, we do not intend to confine ourselves to sugar corporations and the like. We shall deal largely in mercantile corporations. There is a lot of business done in these that never comes before the public and the majority of business people are consequently in the dark.

"On next Tuesday we have another meeting and at that time our by-laws will be arranged and we will have a place of meeting decided on."
