

TO SUPPRESS CANTEENS.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 17.—Judge Simonton, county court, today decided that canteens for the sale of liquor to soldiers cannot be carried on without a regular license from the courts.

This decision was made in the case of two men who were arrested on complaint of the anti saloon League of the state for maintaining a canteen at Camp Meade. Counsel for the defendants argued that they were acting under instructions of the commandant of the camp, who was acting under authority of military law.

Judge Simonton said that he did not recognize such a law when in conflict with the law of the state; that the United States had no authority to issue a license to sell liquors in the states. He directed the jury to find a verdict of guilty and then suspended sentence.

At the same time he notified all concerned that if there were any more violations of the law he would sentence them all. The commandant of the camp promised that the canteen would be suppressed.
