LATEST FROM MAFEKING.

(Associated Press Special.)
New York, Feb. 27.—A dispatch to the World from Mafeking, Bechuana-land, February 16th, by native runner to Mafeking, says:
All are well here.
A dance was interrupted on Sunday, February 11th, by an alarm sounded announcing that the Boers intended to attack the town. There was some heavy firing by the Boers, but it was not pushed home.
The next day, Monday, February 12th, Captain Girdwood (A. S. Kirkwood) lately of the Third Royal Irish Rifles, was mortally wounded. He was universally held in high regard.
There was heavy night firing on Tuesday, the 13th, and Wednesday, the 14th.
"Creaky" (apparently the nickname of a Boer siege gun) was dismantled at nightfall on the 14th and had disappeared on the morning of the 15th, Thursday, but during the day turned up five miles west of Mafeking and began shelling the town at noon, the range at that distance being as favorable for her as that from her previous position, while she is inaccessible at present to the gradual advance of the British garrison (by running trenches.)
The last advance made the Boers uneasy.
There was firing all Thursday night. It was a pretty sight but too much of that sort of thing falls upon one.
Today, the 16th, bullets have been falling everywhere and very viciously. The British guns occasionally stir up such a response.

The sailing of the steamer Maui for Molokai and Hawaii is postponed until next Saturday at 12 m.
The Commissioners of Public Instruction will hold a meeting this afternoon if a quorum attend.
It may be well for the public to know that the Bishop museum has no open days in the present situation.
Up to last Wednesday evening the Keauhou had put 8800 bags of sugar on the bark Edward May, at Makawell.
Ladies of the Free Kindergarten Association are canvassing for subscriptions for the maintenance of the Castle Home for children.
Former Agricultural Commissioner Clark is said to have a "regular park" at his place at Wahiawa. He has some fine orange trees and fine tomatoes.
Attorney General Cooper is engaged today defending his colleague, the Minister of the Interior, against the Wahiawa company writ of mandamus.
Beretania avenue is becoming beautifully decorated with shacks, their esthetic effect being heightened by disregard of Board of Health regulations.
The California colony is calling for a new bridge on the government road near their headquarters. The bridge was promised but the plague in Honolulu has delayed work.
Farmers in nearly every Northwest-ern State are planting nut trees along with their peaches and pears, and are utilizing the hillside, where nothing else will grow, for nut orchards.
The British Consul signed the crew shipped by the captain of the Inverness-shire. The manager of the Seamen's Club merely rendered what assistance he could to the captain and consul.
C. W. Macfarlane has assumed the management of the Hawaiian Hotel Annex, owing to the resignation of Mr. Barlow, who leaves for San Francisco by the next Australia on account of ill health.
C. P. Billings, for many years an engineer on the Northern Pacific Railway, arrived in the Alameda. His intention was to get a position in a sugar mill, but finding things so tied up here he is tempted to return to the Coast by the next steamer.
If J. C. W. Beckham makes good his claim to the Governorship of Kentucky he will doubtless be the youngest State Executive in this country. He was 30 years old a few days before the November election, and thus just eligible under the Kentucky Constitution.
It is probable that the Hongkong Maru, billed to leave here for San Francisco on the 16th, will take passengers. Quite a few have booked and if they have the same luck as those who were taken by the America Maru, they will be landed within five hours after entering San Francisco harbor.
