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MONEY FOR CLAIMS COURT. (Continued from page 1.)

regarding this claim of Mr. Zerbo's as meritorious. There were many items of unpaid bills in the estimates, some of them having been compromised, and if it were competent to act on such he considered this claim and more merit than the others. It was time something were done, at least the Council should give the matter consideration. The matter was before the last Legislature, but it was still in the courts. He moved that the petition be laid on the table to be considered with appropriations. Carried.

Mr. Robinson presented a report of the committee on items submitted by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, which was tabled to be considered with the bill.

Mr. Gear presented two reports from the committee on Interior items. Laid on table to be considered with the bills. Fire Department. Bills were taken up for consideration and items passed as below excepting as otherwise stated.

Honolulu Fire Department, \$11,461, which the committee recommended be raised to \$66,164. Mr. Achi moved an amendment to make Palama a branch station instead of Kahlbi.

Mr. Jones thought the item of \$4550 for hook and ladder outfit unnecessary, as the high buildings would have fire escapes. Perhaps he had a prejudice against hook and ladder, as he belonged to the volunteer company of that kind forty years ago. It was generally first at a feast but made a fizzle of a fire. After the company had received a banner for its valor, he was expelled for nonpayment of dues.

Mr. Nott, a former Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, said there was not a ladder now fit to raise on a chicken coop. There were several three and four story buildings now and more contemplated. He considered the item necessary.

Mr. Achi had been informed that if there had been a ladder on hand Kamaikapili church might have been saved. Mr. Robertson moved to strike out the hose stations and have No. 1 engine stationed at Palama.

Mr. Isenberg urged retaining the item as recommended by the committee. A house was burned the other day for want of a drop of water, and the Government ought to pay for it as it was to blame.

Mr. Allen explained that the committee's recommendation of hose stations was based on the assurance that there would be water pressure enough to make them effective without engines. Mr. Achi's motion carried, together with the item as recommended.

Repairs, furniture and additions to Government buildings, \$7,000. Committee recommended striking out, but on previous consideration the item was deferred and now the Minister of the Interior presented an expert's estimate of \$4300 for repairs needed by the Judiciary building.

Mr. Young pleaded for at least a portion of the original item, as it was desirable to have sanitary conveniences in different buildings. He also wanted an item for janitor, as through neglect the Judiciary building was in a disreputable condition.

Mr. Robertson renewed his motion of a previous day, to apply the item to the Judiciary building. In addition he would have money appropriated for the conveniences referred to by the Minister. He also argued for means to remodel different parts of the building. There was no building the Government should take better care of than the principal court building.

Mr. Ena seconded the motion. Mr. Jones moved, seconded by Mr. Achi, to pass the item as in the bill. Mr. Achi telling of a disgraceful condition of the courthouse in Kona. Minister Young, in answer to Mr. Jones, said Superintendent Rowell's estimate of Judiciary building repairs was \$2000.

Mr. Ena—And then that's not reliable. Mr. Isenberg moved to adopt the recommendation of the committee. Mr. Gear believed the item was deferred to obtain itemized estimates from the Minister. He seconded the motion of Mr. Isenberg.

Mr. Robertson considered that there was no disputing the necessity of repairs to the Judiciary building, and if the item was not made specific for that purpose the work would not be done. Passed as in the bill. Adjourned at 5 o'clock.

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
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
