RATS EVERY TIME.
The New Zealand Herald has this to
say editorially of the plague in the
Colonies:
"The bubonic plague incubus still
exerts its depressing influence over
social and commercial life, but owing
to the prompt measures which were
taken when the alarm was given, the
dreaded disease has been practically
confined to Sydney, so far as these
colonies are concerned. Trade has
been greatly incommoded by the quar-
antine regulations, but that is a re-
sult which must inevitably follow, and
as the Premier remarked, it were bet-
ter to have no vessels in port for three
months than to have one case of
plague introduced. In Sydney the
plague seems to have been confined to
the poorer and less cleanly portions of
the city. The president of the Sydney
Board of Health recently stated that
the mortality so far has been not much
more than 30 per cent, which is re-
markably low when compared with the
death rate in other countries. His lat-
est statements, however, are not re-
assuring. In the course of an inter-
view this week he said 'the regarded
the plague as in command of the city,
that its spread was due absolutely to
rats, and there was nothing surer than
that Sydney would be a ruined city
unless the rats were killed. The only
people who appeared to be ignorant of
this were the inhabitants.' Up to
date 92 cases have been reported in
Sydney, the deaths numbering 30. Un-
remitting precautions have been ob-
served throughout New Zealand to pre-
vent its introduction."
The expression, "Better to have no
vessels in port for three months than
to have one case of plague introduced,"
and the assertion "that Sydney would
be a ruined city unless the rats were
killed," are awfully significant to
Honolulu, following the experience just
past and facing the future responsibility.

Secretary Porter's Resignation.
Washington, April 13.—Owing to
continued ill health, John Addison
Porter, Secretary to the President, has
tendered his resignation, and the Pres-
ident has accepted it, to take effect May
1st next. George B. Cortelyou of New
York, the present Assistant Secretary
to the President, has been appointed
to succeed him.
Mr. Porter's health was seriously im-
paired about a year ago by a severe
attack of illness, and since then he has
been at times relieved somewhat from
the onerous duties of his office, but
failing to regain his health, and be-
lieving that complete separation from
official cares is essential to his speed-
y and permanent recovery, the Secre-
tary has been constrained to tender his
resignation, which the President has
reluctantly accepted. His physician
enjoins complete rest and change, and
he may have every facility for rapid
improvement.

Gold in the Philippines.
San Francisco, April 16.—The trans-
port Tartar, which arrived Saturday
afternoon from Manila brought ad-
vice from the islands up to March 6th

view in Manila Freedom Odun says:

tions of mineral wealth. I have travel-
ed from Klondike to South Africa, and
I am convinced there is not a much
richer mineral country in the world
than the island of Luzon."

Alger Advises Dewey.
Detroit, April 15.—"I think Admiral
Dewey has made a grave mistake in
announcing his candidacy for the
Presidency," said ex-Secretary of War
Alger in the course of an interview to-
night. "It looks as though the wealth
of praise showered upon the Admiral
since his return from the East has
turned his head. It is harder to resist
prosperity than adversity. I feel sorry
for him, for his ambitions will certain-
ly be unfulfilled. His action is ill ad-
vised. I predict for him in his Presi-
dential aspirations a melancholy dis-
appointment."
