THE CLEVELAND SAFE.

San Francisco, April 26.—The steamer Cleveland, about which so much has been written, arrived in port yesterday after a good run of fourteen days from Hilo. She left Hilo forty-eight days ago and when two days out broke her shaft. Word was sent to Honolulu, but before a steamer could reach the disabled vessel Captain Kiltgard had navigated her into Hilo, where the damage was repaired. The run to San Francisco was uneventful, but much to the disgust of the captain and crew the Cleveland was placed in quarantine. It will probably be the end of the week before she is released.

NOTICE. The Bishop of Papeete has agreed to use a portion of the land of this Association for a Catholic cemetery, thus disposing of the great obstacle usually encountered by cemetery corporations. Several suitable sites are available at prices ranging from \$200.00 per acre up.

The question of transportation is not a serious one the different companies being anxious to secure it, having offered very low estimates. Cremation is so very unpopular and expensive that it would not affect the dividends of a cemetery company one-half of one per cent.

This company will be capitalized at \$250,000.00, divided into 250 shares at \$1,000 each. Subscription lists now open at the office of the undersigned. All subscriptions must be accompanied with a cash deposit of ten per cent.

AN ORDER has been issued by the Board of Health of the Hawaiian Islands, prohibiting, after July 1st, 1900, the burial in Honolulu within a radius of four miles of the Executive Building.

It is now proposed to form a stock company to procure a suitable tract of land near Honolulu and prepare and preserve the same as a cemetery. Ordinarily the large returns upon an investment of this nature is most surprising to those who have never given the subject any attention. In San Francisco the price of a single plot ranges from \$20.00 to \$25.00 according to location.

With allowance for broad paths and wide drive ways, there are 1,212 single plots (1 ft. by 7 ft.) plots to an acre, and (for example) taking the lowest figure quoted above as a uniform rate, the gross receipts per acre would be \$24,144.00.

The average death rate for the past year is over one hundred per month (and this rate must steadily increase in proportion as the population increases), which at \$20.00 each would bring the monthly receipt to \$2,000.00. The probable monthly expense would be:

One Gen. Mgr and Sup't \$50.00
Two grave diggers at \$20.00 100.00
One sexton at \$10.00 10.00
Office rent 50.00
Sundries 25.00
Total \$235.00

It would take about one year at the above death rate to fill one acre, and a profit of \$23,909.00 net expense of \$2,350.00. Deducting this amount plus \$200.00, the reasonable cost of land per acre, from the gross receipts of \$24,144.00, leaves a net profit of \$23,709.00 which is a basis of fifty acres at a capitalization of \$2,370,900 would return an annual dividend of interest of a million over 14 1/2 per cent for fifty years, besides the return of the principal.

The proposed plan is to divide a fifty-acre tract in five parts, one each for Catholics, one for Protestants, one for other denominations, Hawaiian, Japanese and Chinese respectively.

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MR. GARONNE A YANKEE

Seattle, April 28.—The steamship Garonne, formerly operated as a United States transport, has by special act of Congress become an American vessel, and will hereafter fly the Stars and Stripes. Several days ago the Post-Intelligence printed a special dispatch from Washington stating that Congress had passed a special act admitting the Garonne to American registry. The bill has been signed by President McKinley, and the papers will be duly attested in Seattle by Deputy Collector Mitten within a few days.

The Garonne is owned by the Frank Waterhouse Company. Mr. Waterhouse, the head of the corporation, arrived yesterday from Washington, where he went to obtain admission of the Garonne to American registry. The case was an exceptional one in this, that it is the policy of the Administration to refuse to admit foreign built ships to American registry. It appears, however, that the Treasury Department had some months ago granted the Garonne permission to take a cargo of freight and a list of passengers from Seattle to Nome, stopping at Victoria. Later this permission, which was given in writing, was revoked.

In the meantime Mr. Waterhouse had made all arrangements to enter the Nome trade, and the revocation of his permit promised to work a hardship on his company. The matter was laid before the Secretary of the Treasury, who recommended to Congress that an act be passed conferring American registry on the Garonne. This was accordingly done.

One of the advantages that will accrue to the Waterhouse company will be that the Garonne, which was for some time in the Honolulu trade, will be enabled to return to the Seattle-Honolulu line at any time, and can be operated on that line after foreign vessels are barred. Mr. Waterhouse said last night that his company would continue to operate steamships on the Seattle-Honolulu run, and that in order to do so an American vessel of large carrying capacity would either be purchased or chartered for the time being.
