BISHOP'S BENEFICENCE

**GOOD YIELD OF HIS
GOOD WORKS TRUST**

Special Term of Circuit Courts for
Naturalizing Aliens—Judge Little
Will Relieve Judge Hardy
on Kauai.

Accounts of the Chas. R. Bishop
Trust have been filed. Investments are
\$657,000 and cash on hand \$13,335.04.
The income for the year was \$20,335.04
of which \$14,844.60 was devoted to
charitable and educational purposes—
these having been the object of Chas.
R. Bishop in instituting the trust. The
trustees are W. F. Allen, S. M. Damon,
W. O. Smith, A. W. Carter and J. O.
Carter.

W. F. Allen's account as guardian of
the Oppertgelt minors is recommended
for approval by J. A. Thompson, mas
ter. Receipts were \$540, payments
\$509.50. The guardian, for the benefit
of the wards, waived half of the com
mission allowed him by law.

Justice Galbraith of the Supreme
Court has authorized Judge Little to
hold a special session of the Circuit
Court at Hilo to naturalize aliens. The
same will be done for the other cir
cuits.

By order of Justice Galbraith, Judge
Little will go to Kauai to hear causes
at chambers, also to hold the Septem
ber term of the Fifth circuit, owing to
the ill health of Judge Hardy.

Emma A. Nawahi, widow of Joseph
Nawahi, has petitioned that F. Wanden
berg be appointed administrator of the
estate.

J. Keola Paukealani has petitioned
that he be appointed administrator of
the estate of J. Paukealani, who died
intestate. The estate is valued at
\$540.

In the case of Kaulimakaole Lazarus
vs. H. A. Juen and Esther P. Juen, de
fendants, through their attorney, Wil
liam A. Henshall, have demurred to
plaintiff's bill. The action is to re
cover a piece of real estate and several
thousand dollars in money which
plaintiff alleges was obtained from her
through fraud. Mrs. Juen is plaintiff's
daughter.

BRYAN'S FEW SPEECHES

Chicago, Aug. 16.—W. J. Bryan will
make no such extended speech making
tour of the country this campaign as he
did four years ago. He will make a
number of speeches, but they will be
in connection with special occasions
and not part of a general swinging
around the circle. That step was de
termined during the talks which Bryan
had with the members of the execu
tive committee of the National Com
mittee, and that was all that was de
termined. The membership of the
committee was revised so as to give
New York State a representation on it.
Committeeman Head of Tennessee
withdrew, giving as his reason that he
had not time to attend to his duties,
and Norman E. Mack, National Com
mitteeman from New York, was nam
ed in place of Mr. Head on the execu
tive committee.

Captain Craigen Dead.
San Francisco, Aug. 10.—The British
bark Melanope, which sailed from Pan
ama for this port 78 days ago and
upon which 8 per cent insurance was
quoted, was brought the greater part
of the way by Chief Mate Charles
Green, Captain John R. Craigen hav
ing died at sea on June 13th, when the
ship was in latitude 9 deg. 32 min. N.
and long. 86 deg. 14 min. W. The
body was consigned to the deep. Cap
tain Craigen was the owner as well as
the master of the Melanope, which is
an iron bark of 1688 tons, built at Liv
erpool in 1876. He was ill when the
vessel left Panama and suffered greatly
from dysentery before he died. He was
39 years of age and a native of Aber
deen, Scotland. When the Melanope
was only a few days out from Panama
Captain Craigen's mother died in Eng
land, and only yesterday, the day the
vessel arrived here, a cablegram was
received announcing the death of Cap
tain Craigen's wife in England.

the Territorial Central Committee of the

for the purpose of electing delegates to
a District Convention. The polls will be
open from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m.

THESE ARE THE
**Rules and Regulations of the Re
publican Party in the Territory
of Hawaii, Governing Precinct
Clubs:**

Article 1. PRECINCT CLUBS.
§1. The unit of organization shall be
the precinct clubs.
§2. There shall be a precinct organiza
tion in every election precinct.
§3. Every person legally enrolled, in
the various precinct clubs, shall be a
member of the precinct club when permanently
organized.
§4. The officers of each Precinct Club
shall be a President, Secretary, three
Judges of Election, and such other officers
as the by-laws of said precinct may pro
vide. No initiation fees or dues shall be
charged the members of any precinct club.
All officers shall serve for one year, or un
til their successors are elected. Any du
ly enrolled member of the club may be
eligible to hold office.
§5. The duties of these officers shall be
those usual to said officers and such as may
be provided for in the by-laws of each Pre
cinct Club. The three Judges of Election
shall be sole judges at all primaries.
§6. No less than one-fifth of the mem
bers enrolled shall constitute a quorum for
the transaction of business.
§7. The President and Secretary of
each precinct club shall act as a revising
board of the roll of the Precinct Club, and
from time to time shall meet and revise
said roll so that it shall consist of only

§8. Each precinct shall at the primaries
elect, besides the officers aforesaid, dele
gates to the District Committee.
§9. Each precinct shall be entitled to
elect one delegate to said district com
mittee for each 25 votes cast in said pre
cinct for the Republican ticket at the pre
ceding election. Whenever after dividing
said Republican vote by 25 there is a remain
der of 15 or more, then the precinct is en
titled to an additional delegate, but each pre
cinct shall be entitled to at least one dele
gate to said district committee, although the
Republican vote as aforesaid in said pre
cinct shall be below 25.
§10. Any person who is a duly enrolled
member of a precinct club shall be eligible
as a delegate to the district committee.
The above Rules and Regulations of
the Republican Party in the
Territory of Hawaii, are also pub
lished in accordance with a Resolution
passed at the same meeting referred to
above.

cers members of all Precinct Clubs the im
portance of prompt and harmonious action
in relation to the above call.

These are the Rules and Regulations of

said district.
§2. Each district committee shall meet
when notified to do so by the Territorial
Committee, and shall elect the following
officers: President, Vice-President, Sec
retary, Treasurer, and such other officers

and standing committees as it may be en
titled to.

§3. Any duly enrolled Republican shall
be eligible as a delegate to the Territorial
Committee from the district in which he
resides.

§4. Each district committee shall be
charged with the general care and super
vision of the affairs of the party within
its district, subject to these rules and reg
ulations. It shall take such measures as it
deems necessary and expedient to secure
the organization and maintenance of pre
cinct clubs in every precinct, and secure
the cooperation of all Republican voters
with the party organization, and shall, un
der the control of the Territorial Com
mittee, have charge of all campaigns in the
district. It shall decide all disputes from
the precinct organizations and contests
within said district as to primary elections.
§5. District committees may hold regu
lar or special meetings as may be provid
ed in their by-laws, and not less than one
third of the members shall constitute a
quorum.

The above Rules and Regulations of the
Republican Party in the Territory of Ha
waii, are also published in accordance
with a resolution passed at the same
meeting referred to above.
