May Carry Russian Supplies.

S. F., Aug. 22.—The Norwegian steamer Eldsvold, Captain Schlyder, arrived yesterday morning, forty-one days from Kobe, thirty-seven days from Yokohama, and ten days from Honolulu, with an Oriental cargo consigned to Brandenstein & Co., and began discharging at section 1 of the wharves. It is reported that the steamer has been chartered to take a cargo of supplies to Port Arthur for the Russian army.

Vessels Built During July.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—The Bureau of Navigation reports that 105 vessels of 35,944 tons, were completed and officially numbered during the month of July in this country. The largest was the steamer Moro Castle, of 6004 tons which was built at Philadelphia, and the next two in size were steamers for the great lakes.

The Largest Lighter.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—The Piper-Aden-Goodall Company is having a lighter constructed at Anderson's yard at South San Francisco which will be the largest of its kind on the bay. The lighter will be 130 feet long, with a width of 34 feet and depth of 12 feet. It will be provided with a derrick and is to be used for coaling ships.

WARRIMOO IN PORT.

The C. A. S. S. Warrimoo, Phillips commander, arrived off port early this morning and hauled alongside the Pacific Mail wharf at about 7:30 o'clock. Her run up from Sydney was exceptionally swift and, for the two days previous to arrival, it was necessary to slow down in order not to arrive in Honolulu at night time. NEWS OF THE TRANSPORTS.

The Transport Strathgyle took on the last of her 720 horses at San Francisco on the morning of August 22 and sailed at about noon on the same day for Nagasaki and Taku. A detachment of ninety-three cavalrymen under Lieutenants Charles E. Stodter and H. J. Brees sailed on the Strathgyle. They are in charge of the animals.

S. F., Aug. 22.—Freight is being put on board the transport Egrot, which will sail direct for Taku, the supplies being intended for the Quartermaster's Department. The transport Belgian King will come down from the Union Iron Works tomorrow, and taking on the siege guns and a number of horses, will sail next Sunday for China.

As soon as the transport Westminster arrives from Manila, she will be loaded with commissary supplies and dispatched for Manila again.

New Ship Commerce.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—The new four-masted schooner Commerce, recently completed at the Alameda shipyard, has been officially measured and found to have a length of 184 feet, breadth of 38.6 feet, and depth of 13.4 feet. Her gross tonnage is 688.28, and net tonnage 621.50.
