More Contracts Let for Pacific Liners Philadelphia, Nov. 26. — It is learned that the New York Shipbuilding Company has contracts for building two steel steamers, besides the two of which mention has already been made, for the American-Hawaiian S. S. Company. One of these steamers is also for the American Company, but it will be much larger than either of the two previously ordered, while the fourth vessel is for Robert N. Dollar, the lumber merchant of San Francisco. The steamer for Dollar is to engage in the Pacific coast lumber trade. The vessel is to be a single screw steamer of about 300 feet in length. The additional steamer for the American Company, which is to run its vessels between New York and San Francisco and Honolulu, is to be 470 feet in length and will have twin screws. She will be 110 feet longer than the other two.

THE MONITOR NEVADA Bath (Me.), November 24.—The United States Monitor Nevada, in tonnage the largest Government vessel ever built by the Bath Iron Works, was launched today. The proceeding was witnessed by a large number of people, the size of the vessel and her character having attracted wide interest. The vessel was released and started down the ways in a novel manner by Miss Annie C. Boutelle, the youngest daughter of Congressman Charles A. Boutelle, who christened her. The hull, held in place until the last moment by a careful adjustment of the shoring and a strong cable, was set free by severing the rope at the proper moment. Miss Boutelle used a silver hatchet provided by the builders. As the monitor started down the ways Miss Boutelle dashed a bottle of American champagne across the bow and christened the vessel "Nevada."

Captain Whitney reports an uneventful voyage, and is pleased to find that he is enabled to discharge his cargo, and make a rapid clearance. The ship Kennebec moved into the stream yesterday after having taken on six hundred tons of ballast just enough to stiffen her. Captain Lewis will get away Thursday to Port Townsend, having shipped a crew of Japanese today. The Geo. D. Curtis will also get away Thursday for the Coast with a cargo of sugar.
