



LAST DAY OF JULY TERM

Judge Gear rendered a decision today in the case of J. B. Atherton vs. Wahlawa Sugar Co., Ltd., on the plaintiff's exception to portions of the defendant's answer on the ground that they were scandalous and impertinent. The decision sustains the plaintiff and orders the objectionable portions expunged. The portions expunged relate to the provision of the Organic Act limiting corporation ownership of land to tracts of 1000 acres. The suit was originally brought by J. B. Atherton in equity to remove cloud from title to certain lands. Defendant had land under lease from John Emmeluth who held under lease from George Galbraith. Plaintiff had lease to same land from George Galbraith as reversioner under Emmeluth. Defendant defaulted in payment,

whereupon plaintiff took possession and claimed title. Defendant refused to cancel lease, and in answer to complaint set up the 1000-acre provision of the Organic Act, alleging that plaintiff was asking a court of equity to aid in violating this law. This answer was excepted to by plaintiff, who is sustained by the court. Permission to sell real estate was granted. Judge Gear today to John A. Baker, administrator of the estate of Piwi Panewa. Pro forma judgment denying a new trial and plaintiff's exceptions thereto were filed today in the case of Kapulani Estate vs. Kaneohe Ranch Co. TRAINING SHIP ALERT FOUND TO BE CRANKY

San Francisco, July 23.-It was learned yesterday that the remodeled training ship Alert will not after all be sent on a voyage to Honolulu and Yokohama with apprentices, on account of the inability of the vessel to carry sail. Two or three weeks ago the Alert came down from Mare Island after having been laid up three years undergoing repairs and an overhauling and was scheduled to sail the same week for Yokohama. Instead of sailing, however, the ship returned to Mare Island, ostensibly to have slight repairs made to the condensers. Now the information comes from an apparently reliable source that a test made in dry dock at the island showed that the Alert, although well down in the water, would not carry sail. On this account, instead of sending the vessel on a long trip across the Pacific she will first be taken for a trip along the coast to Puget sound, when a practical test of the Alert's sail carrying capabilities will be made.

The Alert was reported as having left San Francisco and was supposed to be well on her way here.

PRACTICAL POLITICS

REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE

MAKES NOMINATIONS

Members Gratified Because Judge Gear

Makes it Possible for it to

Act on American

Plan.

A meeting of the Republican Central

Committee was held last evening as a

result of a communication addressed to

it by Judge Geo. D. Gear, with refer-

ence to certain appointments. His

letter stated that while out of politics

he desired to call the attention of the

committee to the fact that under the

appropriation bill passed by the Legis-

lature, as Second Judge of the Circuit

Court, he was entitled to appoint a

clerk, a court interpreter and a

grand jury bailiff. He stated that he

desired to promote the same respectfully

requested the committee to meet and

agree upon nominations for the posi-

tions named.

The meeting was accordingly held

last evening, those present being

Chairman Kennedy, J. P. Cooke, Mr.

Kepoika, T. McCants Stewart and

B. H. Wright. By unanimous vote of

the committee A. G. Kaulouka,

was named for the position of clerk

and Emil Ney as bailiff to the grand

jury. No nominations were made for

the position of interpreter.

The attitude of Judge Gear toward

the Republican Central Committee

pleased the members of that organiza-

tion exceedingly. Speaking of the mat-

ter, J. P. Cooke said: "That is the

way to build up a strong party orga-

nization."

B. H. Wright said: "Judge Gear's

action is in line with the only method

by which a perfect political organiza-

tion can be built up."

Chairman Kennedy said: "If this

plan is followed out in all departments

of the public service, our party will be

greatly strengthened."

T. McCants Stewart spoke in com-

mentary terms of the incident. He

said: "It is a splendid example of

practical party government. In this

entire system of government along

cized as to method. It is the only

way they are to become potent forces

for the good of the islands and in-

fluential with the higher official cir-

cles of the Federal Government. The

Boyd as a conspicuous example of ac-

tion in line with practical American

politics."
