EX-DEPUTY NAKUNA OFFERS HIS DEFENSE

Bureau of Conveynances, Honolulu, H. I., July 30, 1901. M. K. Nakuna, Deputy Registrar of Conveynances.

Sir:—In view of your retaliatory course since my objections some three months ago to your habit of newspaper reading in office hours, while others with myself were busy forwarding the morning's work, thereby naturally creating a breach and want of harmony between us that is not conducive to efficiency in the public service I have a right to expect of my chief assistant, your commission as Deputy Registrar of Conveynances is this day hereby revoked.

I very much wish that your statement on my promoting you to the position of honor to share with me the duties and responsibilities of this Bureau "that you would do all in your power to show" had verification therefore, from the two standpoints of self and public interest, our official relations must cease.

Answer to Mr. Thurm's letter of dismissal.

Thos. G. Thurm, Registrar of Conveynances.

Sir: In view of the charge you made against me as to my habit of reading newspapers in office hours, allow me to explain.

I am not in the habit of reading papers in office hours if my duties as deputy were not performed.—The instance you referred to was one morning when you reproved me for reading papers about two months ago. The evening before I was at the office till 6 o'clock (while others with yourself were home), working overtime and finishing my card abstracting work of the day, thus leaving me free to wait in the morning till some work was brought in.

Seeing now that you are very jealous of the few minutes of government time that I had used in reading while waiting for work—perhaps you will be able to make public answers to the following questions, viz: Is it not a fact that at times when-ever the whistle blows announcing the arrival of a steamer from the Coast, that within a reasonable allowance of time for the mail to be at your store, that you leave your official work and go to attend to your private business during office hours?

Is it not a fact that you have brought your latest files to the office and read them during office hours?

Is it not a fact that at times when there is an outgoing steamer, that you leave your official duties and go to your store to attend to your private business correspondence during office hours?

Is it not a fact that you have employed me, a government official, during office hours to translate the following articles for your annual, viz: Story of the Menehune, Surf-riding, Canoe-making, Kuia-fish-god (First Part). All of which is now published, also the translation of the second part of the Kuia story which is now in your possession, and not paying for the same as private work?

Is it not a fact that at times you have left your official duties and gone to the Custom House to gather figures for your tables of Imports and Exports for your annual, during office hours?

Is it not a fact that at times you have spent part of your time in the office in compiling and comparing materials for your annual, during office hours?

Is it not a fact that at times you made the government copyist compare with you proofs of articles for your annual during office hours, and not paying for the same as private work?

If you think it is not conducive to efficiency in the public service for the deputy to read newspapers when he has no official duty to do, why did you go to your store and sort papers during office hours? Why did you bring your late files into the office and read them during office hours? Why did you leave your official duties and go to your store to attend to your private business correspondence during office hours? Why did you employ government employees under you to do your private work during office hours?

You have set the example, yet it seems it is all right when you do it, but a cause for discharge from office when your deputy did only one of two above counts.

As to "faithful service" let the public who has business to do with the office judge between you and me; also if you are the gentleman that you ought to be you will admit that I have performed the duties required of me as deputy faithfully before, during and after office hours, and even went to the expense out of my own pocket to employ a helper to answer calls for books and attend to errands and other duties imposed on me by you.

In reference to charge of incompetency, that you gave to the Star reporter allow me to remind you that before you took your vacation to New York I applied to you for a vacation of two weeks which you had promised me. You then admitted to me that if I went you would have to postpone your trip till I returned, which goes to prove that though a mere copyist at the time you had perfect confidence in me to be able and competent to attend to your duties as Registrar during your absence.

I have faithfully performed my duties of Deputy Registrar up to the time that you handed me my discharge at 3 p. m., July 30, 1901.

NICHOLS PLACES ORDER FOR HAWAII CARDS

The Cincinnati Enquirer of July 19 says: Frank E. Nichols, a New Yorker, who has been in the book and stationery business in Honolulu, is at the St. Nicholas to place a large order with the United States Playing Card Company for souvenir decks backed with beautiful illustrations of Hawaiian scenery, which, he says, will be sent all over the world as presents and serve as a great advertisement for the islands.

"We want a cable to Honolulu now more than anything," said Mr. Nichols, "and when we get it our tourists will increase tenfold, for men these days like to keep in touch with their business, however far away. The policy of the Hawaiian Government heretofore has been to sell the public lands in large areas, but it now proposes to sell what is left in small tracts, by allotment and we trust that this will attract many American farmers to our shores. The native party carried a majority of both branches of the Legislature at the last election over the government party, with whom they are at loggerheads. The finances of the islands are in a bad way. A loan is needed, and I am afraid there is serious trouble ahead unless some amicable arrangement is reached soon.

"Business is good, however, and the population is steadily increasing. Honolulu has a population of 46,000.

"The National Government proposes spending \$1,000,000 a year for ten years on Pearl Harbor, a few miles below the city."

FUNSTON TELLS HIS STORY OF AGUINALDO

Washington, July 12.—The War Department today made public Brigadier General Funston's report of the capture of Aguinaldo on May 2d last. It shows that Funston's entire plan of the expedition was submitted to the Commanding General of the Department of Northern Luzon and then was sent to General MacArthur, by whom it was approved. General Funston goes into details concerning the captured correspondence of Aguinaldo and the use he made of Gen. Cogido mundo, who had presented himself to Lieutenant J. D. Taylor of the Twenty-fourth Infantry with letters from Aguinaldo which he was to deliver to various insurgent chiefs.

Of the actual capture General Funston says: "The Macabebes started up into the town, and we heard a few shots, followed by scattering firing. We hastily crossed the river and, running up, found that the Macabebes were somewhat demoralized and firing wildly in every direction.

"They were controlled with some difficulty. Aguinaldo's guard of about fifty armed men, neatly uniformed, had been drawn up to receive the reinforcements and, being fired into, broke and ran, a few of them returning the fire as they retreated. Aguinaldo, with his officers, was waiting in his quarters. Placido and Segovia entered the house to report their arrival, and after a short conversation Segovia stepped outside the house and ordered the Macabebes, who had just come up from the river bank, to open fire on the insurgents, who were standing in line at a distance of about fifty yards. The Macabebes were so excited and nervous that their fire was very ineffective. But two of the insurgents were killed, the remainder taking flight, throwing down eighteen rifles and 1,000 rounds of ammunition.

"As soon as Segovia had given the order he ran back into the house and opened fire on the officers surrounding Aguinaldo, wounding Villa and Hambray. The latter jumped out of the house into the river and was not seen again. Villa, on being wounded, surrendered, as did also Santiago Barcelona, Aguinaldo's treasurer. The five remaining officers escaped from the house and swam the river. Placido seized Aguinaldo, and told him that he was a prisoner of the Americans. At this juncture the Americans arrived on the scene, and gave their attention to getting the Macabebes under control, and protecting the prisoners from them. One Macabebe was slightly wounded by a gunshot in the forehead."

In conclusion General Funston deals out praise generously to all who shared in the expedition, mentioning Captains Hazzard and Newton, Lieutenants Hazzard and Mitchell and especially praising Lieutenant Taylor for the discretion he showed after having obtained the Aguinaldo letters. He also speaks in high praise of Commander Barry of the Vicksburg and the assistance which the navy rendered him.
