NEW HORSE DISEASE.

Buffalo, Sept. 2.—Two thousand horses in Buffalo are afflicted with a new disease which veterinary surgeons call grip, because it corresponds in symptoms mostly to that disease. It is an affliction similar to the one recently developed in New York city, and it is thought the disease is working westward from New York. The first symptoms are coughing, then a swelling develops in the throat, and if this is neglected the horse loses his appetite and later is unable to breathe. Paralysis follows and the animal must be shot.

In some of the local livery stables all the horses are sick with the disease, and it seems impossible to check it once it has broken out in a stable. If treated in time, horses are invariably cured.
