CUTTING OFF HEADS

BOXER LEADERS ARE PAYING THE PENALTY

Empress Dowager Seems to be Making Good Job of It—Many Officials Degraded—General Cleaning Out.

Tientsin, Oct. 29.—An Imperial edict just issued at Se-Ngan Fu indicates that the Chinese government is being administered from the temporary capital with as much vigor as it ever was from Peking. The edict deals exclusively with mandarin who were concerned in aiding the Boxers last year. The Emperor deprecates the destruction of life and property that occurred and announces that fifty-six mandarins, many of the highest grade, have already suffered extreme penalties of the law. He continued that his brother has just presented the throne a fresh and revised list of mandarin deserving punishment, all of whom are ordered punished as recommended.

The list includes eighty offenders, including some high military officials, general governors and many prefects and district magistrates. Some are sentenced to death and others to banishment. The list is a startling one. It is not wholly satisfactory at Shanghai and Hongkong, because it fails to include high imperial officers who abetted the Boxers. By another order thirty-five officials and murderers are ordered executed or banished for the Chuchow massacre. Credit for this distribution of justice is due Sir Ernest Satow, British Minister at Peking, who has determined that these murderers, in particular, should be punished. Governor Liu of Chekiang is degraded and banished to his native town. Yungchuan, provincial judge, is degraded and banished to Szechuan. The Governor of Chuchow is stripped of all honor and ordered to perpetual banishment in Kashgaria. Brigadier General Yu died before the sentence of banishment could be carried out. General Chouchitche, commander of the local troops at Chuchow at the time of the massacre, was executed there September 28th. Many local officials were degraded. Fourteen of the actual murderers were executed. Nine accomplices were banished for life and seven imprisoned. These comprise the most sweeping punishments yet inflicted for Boxer outrages.

Li Hung Chang has completed negotiations at Peking for the purchase of 750,000 rounds of ammunition for Mauser rifles from a German firm at Tien Tsin. In acquiring this powder China is but buying back her own, since the ammunition was taken from Chinese troops by the allies in the native city of Tien Tsin last year. Later it was sold at auction. Li Hung Chang found that the ammunition could be bought cheaper than manufactured. It is being distributed among Chinese troops equipped with Mauser.

Billiard Ball Extinguisher.

An entirely new performance with one and billiard ball has been given by the famous billiard player, Robert de Bremond, and has evoked a great deal of applause from billiard enthusiasts.

Mr. Bremond calls his trick the "William Tell." He performs it on an ordinary billiard table, upon which a lighted candle has been placed.

By hitting a ball with his cue ball, he sends the former over the flame, describing an arc. The holder or candle is not touched by the ball, but its motion extinguishes the light.—New York Herald.

HOW PIGEONS TRAVEL.

The carrier pigeon, when traveling, never feeds. If the distance be long it flies on without stopping to take nutriment, and at last arrives thin, exhausted, and almost dead. If corn be presented to it it refuses to eat, contenting itself with drinking a little water and then sleeping. Two or three hours later it begins to eat with great moderation and sleeps again immediately afterward.

Washington, Oct. 16.—President Roosevelt said today that there is a new isthmian canal treaty and that it would go to the Senate with his personal approval.

This statement was made tonight by Senator Morgan who today had a talk with the President about the canal and other matters. Continuing, Mr. Morgan said: "My conviction is that the isthmian canal is a certainty. Nothing can prevent it. It is a fixed fact. The canal is just as necessary to the commerce of this country as are any of the railway systems. One might just as well suggest the removal of the Pennsylvania or New York Central Railroad as to suggest that a canal across the isthmus should not be built. There is but one route practicable, and that is the one through Nicaragua."
