## MAKES NEW RECORD TO COAST FROM SYDNEY

San Francisco, Dec. 17.—The Oceanic Mail Company's Sonoma had a rough time of it coming from Honolulu, but nevertheless she broke the record and came in ahead of time. The Coptic left the islands fourteen hours ahead of the mail boat, but only anchored in the stream one hour and a half ahead of her. The official report shows that the mail boat made the run in 5 days 13 hours 26 minutes, while the British ship took 5 days 1 hour 30 minutes to make the run. She got in ahead of the Sonoma, however, and her passengers were landed before the Oceanic's flyer had a chance to dock.

The general reader can work out the average for himself. After leaving Honolulu both the Sonoma and the Coptic ran into a howling gale. For four days they were under a slow bell but as soon as Chief Engineer Little could get a chance to open out the engines of the Sonoma she logged her 405 knots the first day. Taking it all around, the Sonoma averaged fifteen and a half knots during her 7000-mile run, which is a splendid showing for a new boat. Chief Engineer Little thinks there is no boat faster on the Pacific. Her steaming time from Sydney via Auckland, Pago Pago and Honolulu, 7233 miles, was 15 days, 8 hours and 33 minutes.

San Francisco, Dec. 19.—Officials of the transport service yesterday announced definite dates for the departure of transports for Manila. The Sheridan will depart on January 1st, the Kilpatrick on January 1st, the Thomas on February 1st, carrying the Twenty-ninth Infantry, and the Grant to sail about the same time on a special trip with insular employees and school teachers.

## NEWS OF MATTEWAN'S WRECK IS CONFIRMED

San Francisco, Dec. 18.—Capt. Chas. Hall of the steamer Edith and Capt. George Seaman of the steamer Cearla, both arriving yesterday from Puget Sound with cargoes of coal, reported that the weather was exceptionally fine all the way down the coast, which goes to show the great contrast in the moods of the northern sea. No sign of the Matteawan was seen by either vessel. The Edith kept off shore about seventy miles as far south as Cape Blanco, when the steamer came closer in shore. Captain Hall confirms the report that wreckage from the lost collier Matteawan was found on the northern coast. It consisted of five buckets, a medicine chest and minor articles, all with the name Matteawan showing plainly, and were found by Indians at a reservation situated near a cove in shore from Carroll Island and about thirty miles south of Cape Flattery. The wreckage was reported by an Indian boy attending school on Puget Sound, who had just returned from a vacation spent with his people on the reservation. In the opinion of Captain Hall the steering gear or rudder of the Matteawan became disabled, allowing the big collier to drift upon rocks near Carroll Island. The velocity of the gale in which the collier is believed to have gone down reached 120 miles an hour for a time.

New York, Dec. 19.—A despatch to the Herald from Buenos Ayres, Argentina, says: The Swedish Antarctic expedition under Dr. Otto Nordenskjold has arrived at this port. Dr. Nordenskjold expects to return to Sweden in May, 1902.
