DAMAGES FOR A LIFE

The relatives of Charlie Ah Fai, the Chinese boy who was killed by an electric shock at McInerney's store on the 28th of December last, are determined to recover damages for his death, and have placed the case in the hands of the law firm of Gill & Farley. Seen at his office in the Magoon building yesterday, Mr. Gill was asked by a Bulletin reporter if it was true that his firm would bring suit on behalf of Ah Fai's relatives.

"Yes, it is true that suit for damages will be brought," said Mr. Gill. "Mr. Farley and myself were retained on the case some time ago."

"When and against whom will the suit be brought?" was asked.

"That question I cannot answer," said Mr. Gill. "My partner, Mr. Farley, who has made a specialty of just such cases as this, has the matter in charge. I have canvassed the case with him in its every phase and he has assured himself of good legal grounds on which to base action. When and against whom suit will be brought I cannot say. Mr. Farley has fixed the legal responsibility, but suit will not be instituted until we receive certain papers from China and several weeks will have to elapse before those papers are received."

"Would not Mr. Farley give some information upon this subject?" was asked.

"I tell you positively that at the present time Mr. Farley will not talk on the matter," replied Mr. Gill. "I can assure you that he will not say one word on the case, no matter how he might be pressed to do so."

FOR A FLAT RATE.

At the meeting of the Hawaiian Electric Co. yesterday a resolution was presented providing that the company place its service on the basis of a flat rate. This proposition met with a storm of objection. It was argued that, should this be done, each user of electricity would burn his lights all the time and so make it impossible to supply the town with the present plant. It was finally decided to refer the matter to a committee to report at the meeting to be held February 21. The committee is composed of Messrs. Waterhouse, P. C. Jones and Godfrey Brown.

ALAMEDA QUARANTINED.

When the Alameda arrived in San Francisco on her last trip from this port she was kept in quarantine two hours longer than usual on account of four stowaways—three Porto Ricans and one American. The quarantine officials who boarded the vessel were in a quandary as to what disposition they should make of these men and the steamer had to wait in quarantine until instructions could be had from Angel Island. The men were finally taken over to that island and the steamer proceeded to her slip after a two hours delay.
