DR. WINSLOW'S BAIL FORFEITED

H. L. Kerr & Co. Secure Judgment Against Orpheum Co.

JUDGE HUMPHREYS CALLS THE CIVIL CALENDAR

Judge Gear Makes Jail Delivery of Deserting Spouses—Motion in C. A. Brown Minors Case.

Judge Humphreys yesterday signed judgment in H. L. Kerr & Co. vs. Orpheum Company, declaring that the plaintiff recover from the defendant \$634.71, the amount claimed, \$34.87 interest and \$49.36 costs, a total sum of \$718.94.

The divorce case of Christine Morgan vs. Henry Victor Morgan was continued till next term and publication of summons ordered.

Judge Humphreys called the civil calendar from No. 51 to No. 91 and announced that, in the event of Judge Robinson's appointment being officially confirmed by the coming mail, he might resume the calling of the calendar from the last number reached.

A nolle prosequi was entered before Judge Gear on behalf of Ah Young, who appealed from sentence in the District Court of ten days at hard labor with costs for deserting her husband.

The case against Antonio Garcia sent to prison one month at hard labor with costs for deserting his wife, was dismissed. In the District Court before sentence defendant utterly refused to live his wife or support her.

Mrs. Noeli Markle is another person released from sentence of hard labor five days with costs for deserting her spouse.

These convictions were all under the Hawaiian law of old times, which was repealed in the Reform party regime but reenacted under native pressure in later years. Judge Gear has declared the law unconstitutional.

The appeal of Dr. H. E. Winslow from sentence in the District Court to be imprisoned at hard labor six months and to pay costs, for assault and battery on Rose Lal, was dismissed and bail forfeited. Its amount was \$250.

The case against Ah Kin was dismissed, it having been continued from December 3 last. Defendant had appealed from District Court fine of \$25 and costs for striking Joseph Morse on the jaw.

Robertson & Wilder, attorneys for respondent, Irene H Holloway, under the order to show cause why she did not comply with the previous order of court relative to allowing her divorced husband, C. A. Brown, to see their minor children at certain times, filed a motion that the order be heard before Judge Gear. The reasons are furnished in an affidavit by A. A. Wilder. Affiant believes that the order was made by Judge Gear and was based largely on an examination of the children by said Judge Gear privately, neither the father nor the mother being allowed present. Further, he says that prior to the removal of the minors from the Territory of Hawaii, C. A. Brown requested Judge Gear to prevent their removal by a writ of habeas corpus, but that the said Judge denied the request. Therefore it is submitted that Judge Gear ought to hear the present matter.

George Chalmers of Waimanalo has petitioned for letters of administration on the estate of Mary Ann Chalmers, his deceased wife. The estate consists of an insurance policy of \$5000 in the Manhattan, and the heirs at law besides the petitioner are six sons and four daughters ranging in age from fifteen years to three weeks. George, the eldest child, is in Berkeley, California, and Mary Ann, the next eldest, at Los Gatos in the same State, all the rest being home.

Antone Helgesen, nephew of Anna Kittelsen Jack, deceased, has asked to be appointed administrator of her estate. It consists of a deposit of \$425 in the Bank of Hawaii, and the heirs at law are the petitioner, residing at Kailua, Molokai, and a married sister of deceased at Drannan, Norway.
