WILLET & GRAY'S REVIEW OF MARKETS

Willet & Gray's circular for February 13 reviews the sugar and coffee market, as follows: THE WEEK—Raw declined 1-16c. Refined unchanged. Net cash quotations are: Muscovados, 3.12c; centrifugals, 4.25c; granulated, 4.5c to 4.31c. Receipts, 31,177 tons. Meltings, 27,000 tons. Total stock in four ports, 25,232 tons, against 31,055 tons last week, and 123,143 tons last year. Best sugar quotations, L. O. Hamburg, 66 3/4 per cent, for 88 degree standard. First marks German granulated, f.o.b. Hamburg, 98, equal 4.42c, New York duty paid.

Estimated exports to the United States from Cuba and West Indies, 20,000 tons; Java, 19,000 tons; Hawaii, 10,000 tons; Europe, 5,000 tons; Peru, 10,000 tons, etc., 35,000 tons; total, 80,000 tons, against 110,000 tons last year. Spot Foreign Granulated—The demand is light and the supply very small. Fine Austrian, 4.58c asked, for import. Dutch granulated, prompt shipment, 10s 4 1/2-d, c. and f., and for May-August shipment, 10s 1 1/2-d, c. and f. Fine Austrian granulated for prompt shipment, 9s 8d, c. and f., and for April-May shipments, 9s 3d, c. and f. This week's summary of the statistical position shows stocks in the United States and Cuba together of 258,232 tons, against 220,555 tons last week and 206,760 tons last year, an increase of 57,472 tons over last year.

STATISTICS BY SPECIAL CABLES—Cuba: The six principal ports. Receipts, 26,500 tons; exports, 230 tons; stock, 73,000 tons, against 72,617 tons last year; 150 centras grinding, against 143 last year. Europe—Stocks in Europe, 3,244,000 tons, against 2,562,393 tons last year. Total stocks of Europe and America, 3,592,232 tons, against 2,562,393 tons last year at the same uneven dates, and 2,438,787 tons at the end of date of January 1, 1902. The excess of stock is 739,079 tons, against an excess of 791,739 tons last week, and an excess of 556,682 tons January 1, 1902.

Hamburg—Six hundred and twenty-five tons refined sugar shipped to America. No engagements. RAWs—Larger receipts during the week and smaller demand for refined sugar, caused 1-16c decline in quotations, to 3 5/8c for 96 degree test centrifugals. This is 1-32c per pound below the parity of best sugars today, but the European markets, at the present time, are more under the influence of possible increase of duties in England, than a demand for the United States. Stocks in the United Kingdom, for the same reason, are about double the amount of a year ago, thus the prices for prompt and nearby sugars in best growing countries are maintained and even advanced, while, at the same time, contracts made for distant delivery are 3d per cwt. lower than the current quotations, giving indication of what the European market would be likely to do if not for the abnormal demand existing from the United Kingdom, on account of possible increase of duties. The reassembling of the Brussels conference has been postponed until the 15th inst., when it will renew the discussion regarding the abolition of bounties. It is impossible to act to foresee what the final outcome will be.

REFINED—Owing to the unusually small demand for refined at this time, the meltings for the week are considerably reduced and, with larger receipts of raws, the total stocks have increased 4177 tons. There has been no change in quotations for refined sugar, but as the American market has now caught up with deliveries and are again looking for customers, it is quite possible that they may lead in a decline of refined should the weakness of the raw sugar market continue. The strength of the raw market is only sustained now by the conditions in the United Kingdom and the fact that Cuba remains out of the market with her crop, the receipts in the United States this year from this crop being only 18,170 tons, against 53,258 tons at same time last year.

The abundant testimony taken before the Ways and Means Committee has only just appeared in print for the use of the members of the committee and it was not to be expected that the committee would take any decided action on the Cuba question until they have time to read and digest the evidence, which fills 610 printed pages. There is no question but that Cuba's claims will receive satisfactory attention at the earliest moment practicable and to the full extent that is required to place the sugar industry on a firm and permanent basis.

COFFEE—Many inquiries are being made as to whether values are now low enough, with similar questions in that direction. The only answer we can find is that the market cannot change until conditions change and conditions are not likely to improve any until worse from day to day. There is no further reason for doubt that the present Rio and Santos crop is in excess of all previous yields, and figures are now being named of 16,000,000 bags and upwards for the season. From such a high level of supplies the trade commences to think that any attempt to new crop cannot be very serious. From a level of 9,000,000 bags, damage of 40 per cent would be serious, while damage from 15,000,000 to 16,000,000 bags level still leaves a full average crop. Speculative interests remain on the bull side as a matter of necessity, because the holdings are so very large. The great majority of the coffee trade is also on the same side. If values decline, notwithstanding, it must be owing to the actual weight of the merchandise. An article which falls of its own weight and weakness, cannot rise so easily, and it is a difficult matter to resuscitate it. The trade seems to buy according to its wants, values being about 5 3/4c for Rio No. 7, 5 7/8c for Santos No. 5 spot regular state terms. Prices of cost and freight have been occasionally on the same parity and at others a little higher, but the course of values is not dependent upon the views of Brazilian holders but upon consuming markets.

Futures on the Exchange closed at 5.25 to 5.35 for February and 5.70 to 5.80 for March.

The jurors may receive instruction in the game before the action is brought to a close, a duplicate of the top of a poker table—round and covered with green cloth—has been prepared and is ready to be brought into court, unless objection should be made by Judge Cochrane or counsel. Strauberger declares that Lowenthal stated that he had been charged with cheating at cards and had been asked to resign from the club. He insists that these statements were false and have injured him in many ways. Moses Tannenbaum, insurance broker and brother-in-law of Strauberger, testified that he had intended to take Strauberger into the firm of I. Tannenbaum, Son & Co., but because of what he had heard about him regarding the card game he had not done so.
