Revolutionists Win in Venezuela

Willemstad, Island of Curacao, April 14.—According to a dispatch received here today, General Montenegro, President of the State of Colombia, has turned against President Castro. Together with 300 men he left San Carlos, the capital of Colombia, last Saturday morning and joined a force of 400 revolutionists under Luciano Mendoza.

These revolutionists purpose marching toward Valencia, the capital of the State of Carabobo, which is only three days distant from San Carlos. The defection of General Montenegro is believed to be a serious blow for President Castro, and it is said here that several other Government generals will follow Montenegro's example.

The various revolutionary bands are joining forces, and in two or more large bodies, numbering about 2000 men each, have been marching in the direction of Valencia for the past few days.

General Ochoa Bello, one of President Castro's faithful followers, and the troops of his command were routed last Saturday near El Pilato, a small village about seven miles west of Porto Calhelo.

It is believed here that the Venezuelan Revolution will now progress actively.

Was St. Patrick a Good Baptist?

Southington, Conn., March 16.—The Rev. George H. Gardiner, D.D., from the pulpit of the Plantville Baptist Church declared to a large congregation this evening that all Baptists should wear the green tomorrow, St. Patrick's day. Mr. Gardiner said:

"In his life, teachings, work and belief St. Patrick was identical with that of a missionary of the Baptist denomination of our day, and all Baptists should reverently name him. In his writings there is no trace of purgatory, no adoration of the Virgin Mary, no doctrine of transubstantiation or the authority of the Pope. St. Patrick baptized all his converts by immersion, and from his religious beliefs and practices St. Patrick was rather a Baptist missionary than a Roman bishop."

OBJECT TO TERM "DOC"

Syracuse, N. Y., April 8.—Syracuse physicians have united in an effort to start a movement against being addressed as "Doc."

Their plan is to call attention to the nickname every time they hear it and ask that it be discontinued in addressing them. They think it is correct enough to call druggists and veterinary surgeons by the nicknames, but not doctors of medicine. A well-known physician said today, as he corrected a friend who used the offensive diminutive:

"I hope you won't be offended, but we physicians consider the term 'Doc' an insult. Call us by our Christian names or family names, but please not the nickname. It is unworthy of the profession and belittles the men in it. You can call a horse doctor or a druggist 'Doc' without offending the proprietors, but not a physician. If the newspapers will assist in breaking up the habit, they will earn the gratitude of the men in the profession."—Washington Times.

WATERFRONT HUMOR

"PRACTICAL HINTS" TO CAPTAIN'S COMING HERE

Advice Is To Beware of Many Things --Author of Circulars Not Known -- His Identity Suspected.

Some of the wags along the wharves are having a lot of fun just now watching the effect of a certain circular they issued a couple of days ago in having on the captains, shipping men and others who frequent the waterfront. The circular, copies of which are now to be found in all of the ship chandlery and shipping offices on the waterfront is headed "Practical Hints to Masters Bound to Port of Honolulu," and runs as follows:

1. Beware.
2. Beware of the Court, as there are no raisins in the hash at Oahu jail.
3. Beware of the United States Assistant District Attorney, for it is said that he was in former days a notable sea lawyer.
4. Beware of certain land sharks with an Irish colored sign on their front window. Do them or they will do you. If they offer you a rebate on your bill turn it in to the credit of the ship. It is said that all owners are informed of any rebate handed to masters and your owner will expect to see it in his statement.
5. Do not allow any of your friends to board your ship until the boarding officer has finished his examination; if you do, you may not see them again for thirty days.
6. Remember that it is the law to have your certificate framed under glass and hung in a conspicuous place. The writer recommends that you have it hung up alongside of your forecastle card. This forecastle card is another important matter.
7. If you arrive with foreign cargo and have your hatches sealed, wait for an officer to break these seals. If you break them yourself you may find yourself "up against the real thing" for then is the time the Collector shows his authority.
8. If your own crew is discharging your cargo allow them to smoke in the hold when the mate is not looking. Grant them this favor or you may lose your crew, and gain the disfavor of the Coast Seaman's Union, which, by the way, is a powerful order.
9. Nine o'clock coffee is a relic of 'olden days and you need not provide it now unless you happen to have a big freight.
10. If you should happen to want decks cleared after 5 o'clock, let the watchman do it, as the sailors are on their dignity after this hour and are in a hurry to get next to a keg of Primo.
11. Sunday morning breakfast in port to consist of ham and eggs, corn bread, fried potatoes, hot cakes with maple syrup and Kona coffee with cream. This is a hard and fast rule with the Union and must be complied with. This food is to be cooked in a "George Curtis" and all masters are recommended to go on board the George ship to see how easily it is done on Sunday morning. Wouldn't that forecastle?
12. Thirty days in jail and twenty dollars—Isn't that a dandy? Talk about rights of American citizens.
13. Balsam Copalva is out of date. Put out your medicine chest with something a little more modern.
14. Provide watch on deck with reclining chairs placed under the lee of the forward house. In this way your men may become rested. Anyway that is the use of the whole watch on deck all night?
15. Wheel houses should be abolished if you expect your mates to keep a lookout in bad weather. If you must keep the man at the wheel out of the rain, why hold an umbrella over him. They are cheap.
16. It is advised that you spread a beach in the forecastle at night, for it is hard to say what might happen if you should reach this port and have the report go out that your men did not get full and plenty.
17. Reports of food shortage are frequent at this port, so do not allow yourself to get into this trouble. One sailor's word is as good as three of beer's in this country.
18. Never allow yourself to be present when a mate licks a sailor. If you do you will be considered more kaffy than the mate.
19. Do not allow the man at the wheel to sleep unless it is good weather.

Today another circular appeared on the waterfront as a continuation of the one the contents of which have just been given. The second circular is headed "New Resolutions to Govern the Admiralty District of Honolulu (To Be Considered by the Grand Jury, now sitting):"

1. Fire extinguishers are hereby ordered to be placed at the head of each bunk in the forecastle, and all the gentlemen in the forecastle are to be provided with mosquito nets by the master one hour after arrival at this port.

2. All ships must go on the dock within six months to have rollers smoothed, so that the man at the wheel will not be disturbed by the jarring while asleep.

3. Currents and raisins are hereby ordered to be cooked with the pea soup and emollient hash.

4. All pea soup to be made from imported French peas.

5. Any ship leaving Australia or any other foreign port for Honolulu must, before sailing, have all grub surveyed by a committee of sailors, and if found to be below regulations, the master is hereby ordered to forfeit his 5 per cent commission on grub bills to the seaman.

6. Any seaman with a sour face or vinegar countenance shall not be furnished with lime juice unless it has first been fortified with 75 per cent "Stimmi's Extra" or "Three Star Brandy."

7. Should any ship or vessel in the Pacific run short of salt at sea, the master shall put in at this port for investigation, where it is promised that his salt will be confiscated by the court and he himself turned loose on the beach to beseech the pity of land sharks.

8. Direct course is to be held from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m. Braiding yards will not be tolerated without the consent of the governing board of the forward house. Any mate found guilty of calling the men out to work or wear ship at night will be found guilty of disturbing the peace.

9. Any master or mate found guilty of turning any man to at 7 a. m. while drunk will be imprisoned for six weeks.

10. Any master or mate who, through drunkenness, is unable to turn the men to at 7 a. m. shall be called upon to either join the Union or pay a fine of \$100 to Siskel Krut.

All masters now in this port are hereby ordered to meet as a Committee of the Whole at the usual resting place next to the land sharks' office, at which time a special committee will be appointed to offer suggestions to the Grand Jury. PER ORDER.

The author of these circulars is not known, although a pretty close guess can be made.

TO ARRANGE INSURANCE.

HACK REGULATIONS.

Notice is hereby given that the following changes and additions have been made in the Rules and Regulations and Rates of Fare governing licensed vehicles in the district of Honolulu, to take effect from and after May 1, 1902:

Hack Stand Abolished. No. 3, Hakal side of Beretania street, east side of Nuanu street.

Additional Hack Stands. No. 24, Situate on the Ewa side of Union street, mauka of Hotel. No. 25, Situate Ewa side of Alakea street, between Halekauwila and Alen streets, opposite Fishmarket.

Change of Rules. 18th. To and from any point between Punahou street and Kamohili Church to Walkist bridge, on the east; and mauka along Wilder avenue to Metcalf street, in a direct line to Kamohili Church. On the west to the Kamehameha fork road on King street, mauka along Nuanu street to the premises of the Hawaiian Clay Company, and across Wilder street, including the Puunui tract, not to exceed three miles. For one passenger, one dollar; for two passengers, one dollar and a half.

Where not otherwise provided, to or from any point within the radius of one mile, 25 cents.

When Ordered Specially for Kapiolani Park: One or two passengers, each way, \$1.15 Three passengers, each way, 2.25

Additional Rule. 24th. If any licensed vehicle shall be found standing in any place but on the appointed stand, the driver shall be liable to arrest by any police officer, unless said driver shall be under engagement or have permission from a police officer.
