The Credit System AND OTHER MATTERS Discussed by Merchants

LECTURE SCHEME. KNOCKING OUR COFFEE. HONOLULU FAIR.

Members were slow in arriving at the Stock Exchange room for the meeting of the Honolulu Merchants' Association set for 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It was 3:45 when Vice President Dimond called the meeting to order.

These were ultimately assembled: F. W. Macfarlane, president; W. W. Harris, secretary; W. W. Hall, R. F. Lange, F. L. Waldron, A. Barnes, D. E. Whitman, P. R. Helm, M. E. Bissell, L. E. Pinkham, A. Gartenberg, M. A. Goncalves, Robert Catton, George Angus, E. A. McInerney, Jas. Gordon Spencer, J. F. Humburg, John F. Soper, M. Phillips, W. W. Dimond, H. F. Wichman and Geo. W. Smith.

Secretary Harris read the minutes of several previous meetings which were approved.

Engagement of Lecturers.

A report from the committee on promotion and advertising was read, which expressed approval of W. C. Weedon's proposition to undertake a lantern slide lecture tour through the United States. It recommended a guarantee of \$100 a month to Mr. Weedon for six months by the association.

The report was signed by H. F. Wichman, Jas. G. Spencer and J. G. Rothwell. Mr. Weedon's letter was read, wherein he offered to go on the tour for a salary of \$200 a month besides steamer transportation between here and San Francisco.

Mr. Spencer explained that the other \$100 a month was expected from the Chamber of Commerce, which had not yet received Mr. Weedon's proposition.

President F. W. Macfarlane came in at this stage and took the chair. He asked for information regarding the state of the funds and the meeting was informed that the treasury contained about \$400, while there were outstanding claims against the association amounting to about \$200.

Mr. Wichman, discussing a motion to adopt the report, said the association had been in existence nearly two years but had little of actual work to show.

The president, replying to a remark about the similarity of membership of the Chamber of Commerce and the Merchants' Association, thought it was of no use referring subjects from one body to another. This association ought to take up questions coming before it on their merits and act independently.

After a conversation had proceeded for some time, Mr. Spencer suggested that the association might bring Mr. Weedon's scheme before the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Phillips, who had moved the adoption of the report, preferred that the association should steply do its own part, leaving Mr. Weedon free to apply directly to the Chamber of Commerce for its moiety of the expense.

It was the sense of the meeting that the male quartet could not be considered. Someone asked if the scheme would not conflict with the movement for a Hawaiian exhibit at St. Louis. The president did not think so, adding that if the reports of the lecture tour proved unfavorable the scheme would not be renewed at the end of the term.

The report was adopted. There was no discussion of the St. Louis Exposition, probably because the committee of Thursday's meeting with Commissioner General Barrett was yet to convene.

Honolulu Fair Time.

Mr. Helm in remarks backed up a letter from himself, after it had been read to the meeting, which proposed a scheme of excursions from different parts of the Islands to bring in people for the holiday events of June 11 and July 4, also for the Fair in the month of July.

Mr. Smith thought that the proposition was well worthy of consideration. As the proposer had said, it was in line with business promotion measures common in Mainland towns.

Mr. Dimond cordially approved of the scheme and moved for a committee to send it along.

Mr. Helm, in answer to the chair, explained that the Fair he meant was an agricultural exhibition under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry.

President Macfarlane thought it would be important, then, to get into communication with Wray Taylor, Commissioner of Agriculture, regarding the exhibition.

Mr. Hall seconded the motion and, it being put and carried, the president appointed P. R. Helm, chairman, W. W. Dimond and Geo. W. Smith as the committee.

Fire Claims Payment.

A letter was read from C. E. Bancroft, secretary of the California Traders and Producers' Association, telling of the assistance rendered by that body, with other commercial organizations of San Francisco, to J. G. Pratt, delegate to Washington of the commercial bodies of Honolulu for the promotion of the fire claims payment bill in Congress. As the enclosure and accompanying newspaper reports had been well covered in the Honolulu evening papers of yesterday, it was deemed unnecessary to have anything further read. It was voted that the secretary forward a suitable reply to the letter.

EWA CHILDREN'S FUN FIRST BASEBALL GAMES

A BIG EXCURSION TO THE WAIMANALO BEACH

Ewa, May 2.—This year Ewa plantation repeated the experiment, which was so successful last year, of giving a May Day picnic to both the Kindergarten and Government schools.

Manager Renton equipped a "special," which was not the regulation "varnished cars," however, but the ordinary "cane cars," sided up, with seats extending around the inside, in coupe fashion. Into these over a hundred and seventy-five children, made up of eight different nationalities, were comfortably seated and transported to the delightful Waimanalo beach, a distance of eight miles, without the slightest accident to any of them.

Many of the ladies and mothers of the children "caught on," making a total of 212. Lunch, including all the soda water the children could drink, and 150 boxes of candy were donated by the plantation.

Much praise is due the manager for the kindness and consideration shown the children. The affair was carefully planned and all necessary provision made to meet the needs of all. Police-man Reade acted as conductor, train dispatcher, brakeman and camp cook. Much of the success of the affair was due to his untiring efforts to make everybody comfortable.

If others could have seen the genuine delight and happiness of the children, there would be more of this sort of thing. The "kids" were once in the world that they love—swimming.

HAS LEASED ISLAND

MOKULOE NEAR KANEHOE SECURED BY JACOBSEN

Fishing To Be Carried On In Extensive Manner--Japanese To Have Charge--Profitable Industry.

Henry Cobb-Adams, principal of the Kanehoe school and tax collector for Koolau, came to town this morning, riding over the Pall from Waimanalo. He returns this afternoon. Mr. Adams states that Mr. Jacobsen, who for a long time was an overseer on the Heela plantation, has leased the island of Mokuloe in the Kanehoe bay, from C. Bolte and is now busy establishing on this island headquarters for what will be extensive fisheries. The island of Mokuloe is rather a small one. It is the one which can easily be seen from the Pall, lying in the beautiful waters of the extensive bay at Kanehoe.

The island was formerly leased to a man who intended to establish on it an extensive chicken ranch, on which he would raise fine-bred poultry, but he gave up his scheme and Mr. Jacobsen has taken up the island with a view to developing the fishing in the bay.

Mr. Jacobsen has already established four or five fishing camps at various points of the island and a number of houses have been built. Japanese will be employed to do the fishing, which will be conducted in a systematic manner. Mr. Jacobsen is a Norwegian and, as such, a fisherman by birth. For years he has made a study of fishing in these waters and is thoroughly familiar with his work. A number of boats and sampans are already on hand, among them being one craft 28 feet in length.

There is very good fishing in the Kanehoe bay and there can hardly be a doubt but that fishing there in a systematic manner will prove to be a very profitable industry.
