SALOON LEAGUE WORK

WILL FIGHT REISSUANCE OF LIQUOR LICENSES

Next Meeting to Be Given Up Entirely to a Discussion of Local Operation.

A meeting of the Anti-Saloon League was held yesterday afternoon for the purpose of discussing various matters in connection with the work of the organization. It was decided at that time that the question of local operation be the sole topic for discussion at the next meeting of the league. Copies of various laws on the subject will be taken up and discussed.

It was reported to the league that there must be a fight made against the proposal of the purchaser of the lease on the little corner of land at Union and Hotel streets, the only place which now extends into the latter thoroughfare. There is a proposition to establish a saloon at that place and the league decided to make representations to the treasurer and to hold conferences with the Superintendent of Public Works looking toward the widening of the street at that place.

The question of teaching temperance in the public schools came up for discussion. The committee in whose hands such affairs usually rest, was instructed to look into this subject as well as that of the employment of a special officer to take charge of the humane and children's protective work.

The league decided to take steps against the reissuance of a license to the Star saloon. Petitions will be introduced. This precipitated a general discussion and it was decided that there should be a list of all saloons with the life of the licenses kept by the superintendent.

The report of the superintendent for the month was as follows:

President and Members of Executive Committee, Anti-Saloon League:—During the current month we have received, signed the petitions that were sent to Kau and to Hilo. The latter contained 125 names of representative citizens of Hilo. These petitions will be laid before the treasurer as soon as he returns to Honolulu.

We are carrying out the resolution of the league in the effort to accomplish the closing of the Honolulu Brewery.

One hundred and fifty subscription books have been procured, with the following address to subscribers:

The Anti-Saloon League has good reason to believe that a new license for the Honolulu Brewery has been illegally issued, and that quick, earnest action can close its doors. A thoroughly reliable firm of lawyers has examined the case and claims that this can be done. They are willing to undertake the task, on behalf of the Anti-Saloon League, knowing that the legal battle will be severe. They will not receive any fee if the courts should decide against them. If they are successful they want the reasonable fee of one thousand dollars remuneration for money and time expended.

The moral influence of several hundred persons contributing not over one dollar each toward such an object will be of great value in showing the desire of the people of these islands to have the saloon evil abated.

If any person desires to have his contribution returned, in case of failure to close the Brewery, let him notify the Anti-Saloon League, Honolulu, and the money will be refunded. Otherwise it will be used for other Anti-Saloon League work.

We, the undersigned, give the amounts opposite our names for the purpose of closing the Honolulu Brewery, provided that, in case the object is not accomplished, the money subscribed shall be returned to those so requesting; otherwise it will be used for other Anti-Saloon League work.

The following letter is addressed to those who may kindly give us their personal help in obtaining subscriptions:

Dear Friend:—The enclosed subscription books will explain themselves.

The Anti-Saloon League is making an effort, through its lawyers, to close the Honolulu brewery, which is manufacturing and selling beer under a license which is, as we believe, illegally issued.

If we succeed in closing the brewery twenty-five primo beer saloons will have to go out of business.

So great a boon is worth a heroic effort.

Believing you are interested in our endeavor to check the evils of intemperance in these islands we ask you to take these books, and with such helpers as you may be able to secure, assist us to raise the one thousand dollars required, and the more than a thousand names we desire.

Please collect the money as you go, so far as this is possible, and forward the same as soon as convenient to:

RUN DOWN BY WHALE

WHALING BARK KATHLEEN WAS SENT TO BOTTOM

Captain and Crew Barely Escape With Their Lives --- Had Prospects of Good Catch.

New York, April 24.—The steamship Modiana, which arrived today from the West Indies, brought the eight survivors of the ancient whaling bark Kathleen. The whaler, which had seen fifty-eight years of service, had been sailing for weeks without catching sight of a whale, when ten days out from Cape Verde she ran into a great school. Three boats were lowered, and in a short time each had fastened a prize. Mate Manuel de Viaria hooked a big cow, and in a comparatively short time had the monster alongside and hoisted in a position to cut away the blubber.

Suddenly a great bull whale spouted not a quarter of a mile from the vessel, and the captain ordered de Viaria and a boat's crew to go after him. In a few moments a harpoon pierced the bull's side, and after splashing he started head on for the Kathleen. The whale struck the bark amidships, crushing in the old timbers, and the vessel began sinking fast. The captain's wife had barely time to get into a boat when the old bark went down. The sailors declare solemnly that the favorite parrot of Captain Jenkins' wife, which she rescued, said plainly as he was being lowered over the side, "D—hard luck, that's what I say, d—hard luck."

The skipper's wife and her beloved bird were followed over the side by the cook, the cabin boy and the master himself. The boat rowed away just as the old Kathleen settled down into the sea that was red with the blood of the avenging whale and his cow.
