

Root May Resign From the Cabinet

Washington, May 8. — Secretary Root's justification of the methods pursued by General Smith in Samar and General Bell in Batangas is rather surprising to many of the Republican members of Congress. The question has naturally arisen why an order by cable for the court-martial of Smith should have been sent by the Secretary of War if he approved the retaliation methods employed. It is well understood that the order for the court-martial was prepared at the White House, but it bore the signature of the Secretary of War. In some quarters the disposition is to believe that the Secretary of War is dissatisfied with the course of events that he may resign. It is pointed out that he would hardly care to remain at the head of the department if Congress should refuse to endorse his approval of the Bell-Smith orders.

Bishop Potter Has Very Sudden Sickness

New York, May 7.—Bishop Henry C. Potter of the Episcopal diocese of New York was suddenly taken ill today, but his illness is said tonight not to be of an alarming nature. The Bishop, late in the afternoon, attended an entertainment given by the boys of the choir school of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine at the orphan asylum on the cathedral grounds. He was scheduled as the principal speaker. When the time came for him to begin his address it was found that he had gone to sleep in his chair. When he was aroused he recovered himself immediately and began to speak. The Bishop had been speaking only a few minutes when he tottered and fainted. Those about him were much alarmed. The superintendent of St. Luke's was summoned and attended the Bishop, who recovered consciousness in a minute.
