BY AUTHORITY

Section 4. The material to be used for the erection of said building to be of brick, stone or metal.



DAMAGES ALLOWED MATE LORENZEN

(Continued from Page 1.)
caused by the improper handling of the appliances and gear of the Noeau by the officers and crew thereof, who had exclusive control of the same in the transfer of this sugar, is plain after a consideration of all the evidence, and the fact of this exclusive control is an important element in this class of cases. (Miller vs. O. S. S. Co. 118 N. Y. 208-9; Cummings vs. N. E. Co. 60 Wis. 612; The Robert Lewers, Estee, J. p. 1-7; and especially is this so in view of the fact that the court is unable to hold that there was contributory negligence on the part of the libellant.

The court next considers the damages. Lorenzen's soundness when the accident happened is mentioned, together with his earning of \$60 a month as a certificated first officer. The court was inclined to agree with Dr. Taylor, an expert called by the defendant, in his judgment that, while the injury was permanent, yet the body of libellant would adjust itself in time to the shortness of the injured leg, and that at the end of two years the leg would be as useful as it was before it was hurt. In that case, at the end of two years, it is not before that time, the libellant would be able to resume his vocation as seaman. The court therefore allows Lorenzen \$1440, being the amount of wages it was reasonable to assume he could have earned in two years if he had not been disabled by this injury.

In addition thereto, libellant was entitled to something for the injury itself and the pain and suffering consequent thereon. According to Dr. Humphreys and Dr. Taylor, the injury was permanent although the disability was not. While the bones had knit the jointer was not perfect but an overlapping one and there was a curvature that would make the leg continue from three-quarters of an inch to an inch shorter than the other. Moreover, he had suffered great bruises—was confined to the Queen's hospital more than three months—still suffering pain and might always do so. The court concludes its decision as follows:

"It is difficult to measure pain in money. In most of the cases examined by the court wherein injuries of a similar nature were sustained, the average damages assessed is about \$4000, in full of everything. However, in the main, these cases show an injury, if not greater at the outset, yet more severe in the permanent disabling effects than in the case at bar. I am therefore of opinion that in view of all the circumstances of this case, the sum of \$1500 would be a fair compensation for the extra pain and suffering endured by libellant, and will allow that amount in addition to the \$1440 already allowed, making a total of \$2940 dollars, together with costs of suit."
