MARU'S ADDITIONS.

KINAU REACHES 'FRISCO.
San Francisco, Aug. 11.—The Inter-Island steamer Kinau of the Wilder Steamship Company arrived yesterday afternoon, ten days from Honolulu, under command of Captain Freeman. She brought a cargo of sugar and twelve cabin passengers. The Kinau comes to be given an extensive overhauling, including an oil-burning plant, and will be the first Inter-Island steamer to substitute oil for coal.

LOCAL AND GENERAL

JAPAN IN KOREA
London, August 13.—A St. Petersburg dispatch to the Globe says that Japanese naval officers on their own responsibility have landed guns, constructed a battery and posted guards on the island of Kethuesan, and that Korean officials who were sent to investigate were driven away by the Japanese.
