DECKER GETS DECISION.

Hilo, Oct. 17.—Last Saturday night the sports of Hilo were entertained with a varied program of athletic contests at the Japanese theater, under the management of Francis J. Bryant. The star event of the evening was a 10-round go between "Spider" Jackson of Honolulu and Joe Decker of Hilo. The ten rounds were fought without serious damage to either man, Decker winning the decision by referee B. L. Jones. The majority of the spectators expected a draw and many of them insist that it was Jackson's fight.—Tribune.

INJURED OR KILLED.

The steamer Hawaii arrived this morning from Maui and Molokai ports with 10 cords wood, 26 pigs, 12 packages machinery, 177 pieces pipe and 44 packages sundries.
The iron pipe was taken on board at night at Kihel. Purser Birmingham states that while there he was told that the train bringing the pipe down to the landing had hit a Japanese woman and a Chinaman. The woman was said to be injured while some stated that the man was killed and others that he was only injured.

A remarkable instance of economical operation of an industrial plant is recorded in the Crystal Palace district of the Metropolitan Gas Company of London. A new retort house is being constructed with brick made by the otherwise idle retort house stokers, and from clay dug from the proposed site of a new gas holder tank. The quality of brick made here is said to be very good, and there is a lively demand for all that the company makes above its own demands. An old disused horizontal retort stack of arches has been converted into very good brick kilns.

REBECCA WANTS LOTS OF MONEY

Rebecca Panee Humeku by her attorneys, Fitch & Highton, has petitioned for the following allowances: To herself, \$25 a week from October 24 until an account is made; to Thomas Fitch, \$50 for money advanced; to J. W. Jones, stenographer, \$43 for services; to Thomas Fitch, an attorney's fee not to exceed \$2500; for furnishing her house, \$1000. She also asks that J. A. Maroon, her guardian, be ordered to make an accounting.
Emmeluth & Co., Ltd., has served notice of mechanics and materialmen's lien on Edmund H. Hart and wife for \$157.01.
Judge Gear approved the final account of W. Pfothenauer, administrator of the estate of Paul F. A. Ehrels with the will annexed, and ordered his discharge on filing of final receipts. The balance is \$10,319.98, besides which there is \$23,000 in mortgages and bonds.
David Dayton's final account of administration of the estate of A. A. Dolron, deceased, has been approved on the report of F. H. Loucks, master. The cash balance is \$141.87, with six legacies of \$10 each unpaid. The inventory is of 11 1/2 acres of land in Nuuanu valley valued at \$4000 and old jewelry at \$10. On filing receipts the administrator will be discharged.
T. McCants Stewart for libelous gives notice to C. W. Ashford for libellant of motion to strike out parts of the libel for divorce of Mary K. Beek vs. John P. Beek. He also enters a demurrer to the application for alimony.

Springston and work will begin at once.
