

GOLDEN STATE LIMITED

SOUTHERN PACIFIC HAS INAUGURATED NEW TRAIN

FAST TIME AND A CONSEQUENT HEAVY TOURIST TRAVEL. TRIP OF EIGHTY-EIGHT HOURS.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—With the inauguration, Sunday, of the Golden State limited, between Los Angeles and Chicago, over the Southern Pacific and Rock Island railroads, the time from coast to coast will be reduced to eighty-eight hours. The limited will leave Los Angeles at 2:30 p. m., and will reach Chicago at 10:30 a. m. in good time to connect with the twenty-hour train for the Atlantic seaboard over the Lake Shore and Pennsylvania roads. The running time from Los Angeles to Chicago will be only sixty-six hours, and, allowing two hours' lay-over at Chicago, through time from coast to coast will be eighty-eight hours, which will be a new record for the distance.

The travel to the Pacific Coast, principally California, this fall, has been exceptionally heavy owing, in part, at least, to the cheap rates which have been in effect during the past two months—rates which expire to-night. Yesterday and today fifty-four tourist sleeping cars, with every berth taken, left Chicago via the connections of the Southern Pacific. This morning no berths were available. There were at least 250 applications for space in the tourist cars, and many of the passengers had to go in the ordinary coaches or reclining chair cars, as the Pullman Company was unable to furnish tourist sleepers. Railroad men anticipate this winter the heaviest passenger traffic to the Coast ever known.

CHILD MURDERERS.

Columbus, Neb., Nov. 6.—Three children, the oldest of whom is 11 years, are under arrest near Humphreys for killing their father, Gerhard Borchers, a farmer and burning his body. Borchers was killed, according to a statement alleged to have been made to the sheriff, by Herman, his 14-year-old son, who used a shot gun which he had purchased for the purpose. Then, with the help of two brothers—August, aged 10, and John, aged 8 years—Herman dragged the body to a strawstack and set fire to it. Herman, who is said to have fired the gun that killed his father, implicates the younger brothers equally with himself, while they put the blame on him. The only motive for the crime given is that the father, who is a widower, did not treat them kindly. Neighbors say they know of no mistreatment on the part of the father.

SOY MANUFACTORY MAY START HERE

Honolulu is to have a soy manufactory here very soon if the plans which an expert in the business is talking up to various business firms of the city are carried through. The proposition is to start in as soon as possible and the man who is handling the matter is so confident that his plans will carry that he has already secured the services of an expert Japanese soy maker who is in the city at the present time.

Soy in this city sells for something like \$2.50 a tub and the manufacture of the article here is calculated to reduce this amount to \$2, a very material difference. It is calculated further that at the start of about 2000 tubs a month could be manufactured. This amount could be increased from time to time. At any rate, the man who is piloting the scheme figures in his prospectus that there will be a return of something like 40 per cent on the money invested.

Soy is one of the articles the consumption of which will never decrease. It is an article that Asiatics must have and when they can get the same thing here at a very much reduced rate, it means the practical cessation of the importations from the Orient.

STEAMER KE AU HOU WILL TAKE PRINCE TO KAUALI

The steamer Ke Au Hou will go out on her regular run this afternoon but arrangements were made with the Inter-island people yesterday afternoon by means of which this company agreed to have the steamer go out of her way and call at Nawiliwili to eight passengers for that port could be guaranteed.

It turns out that eight passengers were found at a moment's notice and so the plans were perfected. The number of people who are anxious to go to Kauai to take part in the big bun to be given there Saturday has increased today until the number reaches something over twenty.
