TWO NEW WHARVES ARE CONTEMPLATED

Naval Station To Build Ten Thousand Dollar Structure.

MAY ALSO CONSTRUCT AN IMMENSE COAL SHED

PRIVATE PARTIES CONSIDER BUILDING NEW WHARF TO ACCOMMODATE LUMBER.

The naval station will possibly in the near future be the possessor of another wharf, which will be located on the Waikiki side of the present naval wharves.

The Naval Station is also to make use of its lot on the Kakaako part on Punchbowl street, opposite the Davies' warehouse.

Still another new wharf is at present being contemplated by private parties and this new wharf, which is to be used by lumber vessels, will be situated between the marine railway and the naval wharf.

RECIPROcity TREATY WILL BE PASSED

If Cuban Negotiations Are Satisfactorily Concluded.

ROOSEVELT IS ASSURED OPPOSITION WILL CEASE

ELKINS HAS PROMISED TO BE GOOD AND OTHERS ARE COMING INTO LINE.

Washington, Dec. 4.—President Roosevelt is assured that if the negotiations with Cuba for a reciprocity treaty are concluded satisfactorily by the State Department, the treaty will be ratified by the Senate during the present session.

While many Senators were and still are opposed to direct legislation by Congress on the subject of Cuban reciprocity, some of them at least, and perhaps a majority among the Republicans, vote to ratify a reasonable reciprocity treaty.

Senator Elkins, who led the anti-Cuban reciprocity forces in the Senate during the last session of Congress, today informed Mr. Roosevelt that he would support a proper Cuban reciprocity treaty, and expressed the belief that such a treaty would be ratified by the Senate soon after its presentation.

Such a solution of the commercial obligations of the United States to Cuba would be entirely satisfactory to Mr. Elkins and many of his Senatorial colleagues, who opposed the enactment of direct legislation because they feared such action would open up a tariff controversy, which, in the view of strong advocates of the protection system, might prove embarrassing if not dangerous to the Republicans.

The President, it is understood, has received assurances from other Senators who last spring opposed reciprocity legislation that they will support by voice and vote a Cuban reciprocity treaty.

CABLE OPEN FOR BUSINESS DAY AFTER ARRIVAL HERE

WILL BE OPERATED FOR A TIME BY MANUFACTURERS--RATES LIKELY TO BE 50 CENTS A WORD--SILVERTOWN PROBABLY ON WAY TO HONOLULU.

Cable Officers To Visit San Francisco

New York, Dec. 2.—C. H. Mackay, president, and George G. Ward, vice-president of the Commercial Cable Company, W. H. Baker and E. C. Bradley, vice-presidents of the Postal Telegraph Company, started today for San Francisco to see the beginning of the laying of the new Pacific cable to connect this country with the Hawaiian and Philippine islands.

NUUANU SECOND BRIDGE

ARRIVE AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Dec. 5.—The beginning of a new epoch in the history of this country was marked by the arrival yesterday of the British steamer Silvertown, 75 days from London, bringing in three spacious tanks in her hold, a length of 2,413 nautical miles of submarine cable that will connect the United States with the Hawaiian Islands.

WORK NIGHT AND DAY

The laying of the cable begins. It is to be given two tests, the last one just before the Silvertown starts on the trip to Honolulu. Compact and ready for immediate use as the cable and the accompanying machinery appear to be, the small army of electricians and chiefs in charge of the work can occupy themselves for a week performing arrangements, and in the meantime the Silvertown will take on a full supply of coal and be made ready for the trip.

TO BE DELIVERED PERFECT

H. Bonest will be in full charge of laying the cable from the Silvertown, and before the departure of the steamer with the long line the preliminaries will be under the direction of Charles Cuttress, the electrical engineer of the Mackay company.
