GERMAN SUGAR LAW

The State Department has received from Ambassador Tower, of Berlin, under date of January 23, 1903, notice that the German sugar bill was promulgated January 12, 1903. This law, which was passed in connection with the adoption by Germany of the Brussels sugar convention, provides:

Article 1. The second and third parts (sections 65 to 70) of the sugar-tax law of May 27, 1896, are repealed.

Act 2. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of the law are changed as follows:

Paragraph 2. The sugar tax amounts to 14 marks (\$2.32) per 100 kilograms (220.4) pounds net weight.

Paragraph 3. The sugar tax is to be paid as soon as the sugar passes out of the customs control into free circulation. The proprietors of manufacturing factories from which the sugar enters into free circulation are responsible for the payment. The sugar is security for the amount of the tax without regard to the rights of a third party. In the same manner goods containing sugar, covered by paragraph 6, No. 1, the field for the tax.

The sugar tax is to be paid by the proprietor of the sugar manufactory in exchange for guarantees for the period of six months. The guaranty can be provided by the deposit of guaranteed bills for their current value, but not above their nominal value, or through bills of exchange and similar securities, of whose reliability the supreme finance authority of the land must have proof, or through first-class mortgage upon the sugar factories up to the half of their value, ascertained by official experts, or through the pledging of the sugar on hand for two-thirds of the market value under the tax control (with official seal).

Art. 3. To paragraph 30 of the law is to be added: The entrance duty for sugar, for which no country has been granted in the countries of origin, is during the continuance of the agreement concluded in Brussels March 5, 1902, raised to the highest sum which is conceded according to the agreement.

The origin of the sugar must be stated on import.

Art. 4. Paragraph 81 of the law is repealed.

Art. 5. Sugar which has been received in a warehouse before this law goes into effect, if transferred to free circulation or to a sugar manufactory after the period mentioned, must repay the export bounty.

Art. 6. This law goes in force simultaneously with the agreement of March 5, 1902, concluded in Brussels between the Empire and a number of other countries, viz. September 1, 1903.

EXECUTIVE NOTICE.

FIRE CLAIM BONDS OF THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII.

By direction of the Governor sealed bids will be received at the office of the Secretary of the Territory until twelve (12) o'clock noon, on Monday, April 20, 1903, for Three Hundred and Twenty-six Thousand (\$326,000.00) Dollars of Territorial Coupon Bonds, in denomination of One Thousand Dollars each, authorized by an Act of Congress.

DESCRIPTION.

These Bonds are to be dated May 1, 1903, and may be redeemed by the Territory of Hawaii after the first day of May, 1908, and are payable on or before the first day of May, 1918, bearing interest at the rate of four (4) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and November of each year, both principal and interest being payable in United States Gold Coin of the present standard of weight and fineness, at Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Bank in the City of New York. These Bonds are signed by Territorial officials and the Secretary of the Interior.

AUTHORIZATION.

These Bonds are to be issued in pursuance of an Act of Congress, approved January 26, 1903, entitled: "An Act to pay in part judgments rendered under an Act of the legislative assembly of the Territory of Hawaii for property destroyed in suppressing the bubonic plague in said Territory in eighteen hundred and ninety-nine and nineteen hundred, and authorizing the Territory of Hawaii to issue bonds for the payment of the remaining claims," by which they are EXEMPT FROM ANY AND ALL TAXES, and the payment thereof constitutes a charge upon the revenues of the Territory of Hawaii.

SECURITY.

The average annual revenue of the Territory for the past two years has been \$2,420,128 95
 The present assessed valuation of the taxable property of the Territory is 122,000,539 38
 Present actual debt, not including above proposed new issue, is 931,970 31

RESTRICTIONS.

Tenders will be received for the whole issue, or any part thereof. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check, payable to the order of the Governor of the Territory, for at least ten (10) per cent. of the aggregate amount of the amount bid upon, the amount of said check to be forfeited to the Territory of Hawaii in the event of failure on the part of the bidder, after notification of acceptance of the proposal, to carry into effect the terms thereof. Bidders whose proposals are accepted will be required to pay ten (10) per cent. in U. S. Gold Coin upon the amount of their bids as soon as they receive notice of acceptance; and to pay in like coin twenty (20) per cent. at the expiration of each ten days thereafter, until the whole is paid. But they may, at their option, pay the entire amount of their bid when notified of acceptance, or at any time when an installment is payable. The price the bidder proposes to pay, the place where he desires the bonds shall be delivered, and the office—whether that of the Treasurer of the Territory of Hawaii, at Honolulu, or Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Bank, New York City—where it will be most convenient for the bidder to deposit the amounts of his payments, must be specifically stated in the proposal. No offer for the purchase of the bonds for less than their face value will be considered.

RIGHTS RESERVED.

The right to reject any and all bids, to waive technical defects, and to accept any part of any bid and reject the other part is hereby expressly reserved to the Governor of the Territory of Hawaii.

HOW ADDRESSED.

All proposals must be addressed to the Governor of the Territory of Hawaii, and must be distinctly marked "Proposals for the Purchase of Four Per Cent. Bonds." Blank forms for proposals and copies of the Act of Congress and the Rules and Regulations published by the Secretary of the Interior may be had upon application.

MADDEN LOST HIS DIGNITY.

Third Assistant Postmaster-General Madden lost his most cherished possession recently, and during the short few moments that he was strenuously endeavoring to recover it, the boisterous hilarity of a number of his subordinates, who were spectators, is causing them some anxiety. Mr. Madden's cherished possession is his dignity. It is a visible, tangible thing, and, as one of his clerks remarked the other day, the general would as soon think of coming to the office in a pair of pink pajamas as in any other garb than a frock coat and high hat. The wind blew a mile and some of the happenings in the open space in front of the Post Office Building rivaled the antics performed by the wind at the famous "Plation corner" in New York. Since the news was printed in the Sun some time ago that Mr. Madden had his lunch served on a Chippendale table with wonderful legs, he has made it a point to go out to his midday meal. He was crossing the avenue in front of the building when he lowered

his head preparatory to making a Madonesque salutation to a passing acquaintance. The wind took instant advantage of the opportunity, and a minute later Mr. Madden's \$10 tie was a black away and going faster with every revolution. There was a moment's struggle between dignity and several other things, and just as the hat made the wheels of a swiftly moving electric car, his dignity lost and Mr. Madden gathered up his coat tails and lit out after the hat. The clerks standing in front of the building, never having seen the General without his cherished possession, did not immediately recognize him, and shouted such expressions of encouragement as "Go it, legs," "Hit it up, old man," "Smash the record for the 100-yard dash," and the like. Mr. Madden caught the tie, considerably the worse for wear, at Ninth street, and returned to his office for breath and repairs.

BUILD NEW WARSHIPS.

Washington, March 9. — Senators Hale and Perkins called on Secretary Moody today and talked of the construction of vessels in Government yards. Secretary Moody agreed at the request of the Senators to build a wooden brig at Portsmouth and a training ship each at the Mare Island and Norfolk yards. The training ships are to be of steel, propelled by sail and are to cost, exclusive of armament, not exceeding \$370,000 each. Secretary Moody was non-committal as to the construction of battleships in the Navy yards. He said it would be three months or more before the plans would be ready. Senator Hale is not in favor of building these big ships in the Navy yards and the Navy Department has a wholesome respect for Hale's opinion, as he practically dictates the appropriations for the Department. Hale said today he expected to live for ten or fifteen years more, but did not expect to live long enough to see the battleship Connecticut completed by the Brooklyn Navy Yard. The training ship to be built at Mare Island will be assigned to the use of the Navy on the Pacific Coast.
